Aluminum Industry in Big expansion

Industrialists Wonder What is to Happen When Emergency Ends.

The United States aluminum industry, now operating under strict federal regulation, is expanding to meet war-born demands, meanwhile wondering what will become of the stepped-up output when the emergency ends.

By CLARKE BEACH Associated Press Staff Writer WASHINGTON, April 9.—(AP)—The office of production management has figured out that refrigerator manufacturers can save 800,000 pounds of aluminum—an amount in the gram job of refurbishing the national defense—by limiting the number of ice trays in each box.

Aluminum, for the moment anyway, is scarce in the United States. It is so scarce it has become the first metal to face nearly all the complications of a wartime economy.

Industrialists wonder what is to become of this vast aluminum output when peace comes and the war-born demand dies.

Meanwhile, the Aluminum Company of America, the sole producer of virgin aluminum in this country up to now and the major fabricator, has been taken to court by the United States Department of Justice for alleged violation of the Sherman Anti-Trust Act.

Before summer, Judge Francis G. Coffey in the United States District Court for Southern New York is expected to hand down his decision.

While the trial was still going on, the Reynolds Company announced it was going into aluminum production, giving A.L.C.O.A. its first competition in that field.

It is expected that the new plant will produce 100,000,000 pounds annually by the middle of next year.

Huge U. S. Battleship Commissioned

NEW YORK, April 9.—(AP)—The 35,000-ton battleship North Carolina was commissioned today before 1,500 special guests at the Brooklyn navy yard.

The \$70,000,000 ship, most formidable in the fleet, and one of the deadliest in the world from the standpoint of shooting power, was the first capital ship to be commissioned by the United States.

In a 20-minute ceremony Navy Secretary Frank Knox told the audience and the world that "we are foreshadowing with this ship the greatest navy the world has ever seen."

The North Carolina is the first of 17 battleships ordered by the navy.

Urges further Investigation

WOODSTOCK, N.B., April 9.—(CP)—Further investigation by the Attorney-General's Department was recommended in the jury's verdict at an inquest today into the death of Jack Niles, who lost his life when fire destroyed his shack here yesterday.

The jury found he died in the fire "as a drunken party in which two others or more took part." Dissatisfaction with the evidence adduced was expressed by the jurors in recommending further investigation.

They recommended also that "more stringent methods be used to control the sale of intoxicating liquors to those of a vagrant class."

Witnesses told of a drinking party at Niles' dwelling. Ellis Akerley said he had refused an invitation to Eric Ferguson and Ken Currie to join them in a social glass.

Akerley said he halted Ferguson to safety, and then saw Niles re-enter the shack. He ran in and grabbed Niles but the roof fell and he was unable to make a rescue.

Ferguson testified he had been drinking the previous night with Currie, and they had bought another gallon of wine in the morning. He said he remembered nothing of subsequent events.

End to soft Coal strike Appears near

 The wage stalemate in the United States soft coal industry appeared near an end last night, but negotiations were still going on to settle the Ford Motor Company strike.

James F. Dewey, federal mediator, said in Detroit that there would be no let-up in the Ford negotiations, but that joint conferences between company and union representatives would be discontinued for the present.

Philip Murray, president of the Congress of Industrial Organizations, who conferred with President Roosevelt during the day, had hinted earlier that an important announcement was expected in Detroit, but it failed to materialize.

The C.I.O. United Auto Workers' Union seeks a contract with Ford, a 6 per cent. hourly wage increase and substitution of uniformed protection employees for the Ford service department.
