U. S. WILL ENFORCE A

OTTAWA, Nov. 12.—(Special).—Messrs. Gilmour, McCullough, Vinnell, Villiers, Brown and Jay, Canadian soldiers sailed Thursday on the S. S. Vancouver for Canada.

METHUEN AND KITCHENER AT WORK.

LONDON, Nov. 11.—(Special).—Lord Roberts reported that Lord Methuen surprised and defeated the Boers near Lichtenburg, capturing several waggons. Lord Kitchener also defeated the Boers November 7th.

The regular monthly meeting of the School Board was held last night. The teachers' reports show the enrollment for the past month to be 1,317, viz: Prince street 577, Queen Square 320, West Kent 420. The average attendance was 1131, the percentage of attendance 88, Prince street making 87, Queen Square 89, West Kent 87. No. cases of tardiness 185; No. truants 9; No. of visits by teachers to parents 316; No. cases corporal punishment 20; No. fell below average in grading 100; No. requests to leave school 152. The highest per centage of attendance in Prince Street School was made in Principal Seaman's room, 94 p. c.; Queen Square, Mr. Landrigan's room, 95 p. c.; West Kent, J. M. Dunean's room, 94 p. c. Miss Laura K Scott reported no cases of tardiness for the month. A communication was read from Mr. Bowness thanking him for keeping his situation for him while in South Africa, and stating that if he were commencing work at once he would not be doing justice to himself or school. He would, however, under certain conditions commence work after Christmas holidays. Mr. Cyrus McMillan will take charge of department for the present. A communication was read from the rector of St. Peter's school asking if the boys of the above school were eligible to attend the voluntary class. The matter was referred to Mr. Collier in charge of Manual Training school. After the passing of a number of bills the Board adjourned.

REV. MR. ALMOND.

The telegraphic information that the Rev. J. Almond, B.A. Anglican Chaplain to the Royal Canadian Regiment has decided to enter the Imperial service is of interest to many outside of the circle in which he moved previous to his appointment a year ago. His career at the front has been unmarked by sensational incidents, but steady adherence to duty, self-sacrificing performance, work of an arduous and trying nature, and a constant and cheerful zeal have

marked his connection with the regiment, have lifted it above commonplace compliance with regulations, and entitled him to an honorable place in the annals of the first contingent.

Rev. Mr. Almond's work compelled attention in the evil days when the enteric fever was wasting the ranks of the army at Bloemfontein. Illness had separated him from the regiment when the march to Paardeberg began, and he was not present on the field where the Canadians received their baptism of fire. That was a circumstance of lasting regret to him, for he possesses an active and adventurous temperament, of the type which finds a relish in the incidents of battle. The epidemic at the Free State capital called forth all the energy of the Chaplains of the army, and Mr. Almond threw himself with his full strength and with rare self-abnegation into the laborious and often harrowing duties which the situation called for. Sorely against his natural inclinations he remained in the hospitals when the march northward began, for the regiment left behind it a rear guard of scores of sufferers who needed his ministrations. When circumstances permitted he left Bloemfontein, and by an energetic bit of travelling rejoined the regiment in time to participate in the entry into Pretoria. His services at the Bloemfontein caused him to be employed to a considerable extent in executive work connected with the alleviating of the condition of the soldiers all along the line of communications, and in all circumstances he showed himself the same kindly, considerate, cheery and unaffected minister of good. A knack for executive work, zeal, practical piety and unselfishness make an excellent equipment for labors such as those to which Mr. Almond has devoted himself and he will be following his career by the good wishes of his countrymen to whom he has been in service.

COUNCIL MEETING

City Notified of Injuries Sustained by a Lady.

A NEW BUILDING

To be Built on the Wharf for the new Steam Roller, Tenders Called.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held in the Council Chambers last night, all the members of the Board being present. In the absence of His Worship Mayor Warburton, Coun. Tanton was appointed to the chair. After the reading and passing of a number of bills the City Clerk read a communication from Messrs. Morson & McQuarrie, solicitors, for Mrs. Walter Lowe claiming damages for injuries sustained by falling on Kent Street.

Upon motion Coun. Wheat, Brown and Taylor were appointed a committee to look into the matter.

Coun. Wheat presented engineers' certificates of the completion of the sewerage system of West Kent Street School and the bill for \$1411.23. After some explanation why the Council were asked to pay the claim Coun. Wheat moved, seconded by Coun. Taylor that the amount be paid and that the Council be authorized to issue debentures for the amount if necessary. Carried.

Upon motion of Coun. Ball, John McCourt was granted \$25 for past services.

Upon motion of Coun. Taylor it was decided to build a shed for the new steam roller and that tenders be called for the same. It is proposed to erect the building where the stone crusher now stands, the crusher to be moved north about 40 feet. The engine of roller will be used to furnish power for the crusher, leaving the city the expense of buying a new engine for the crushing of stone.

Coun. Brown gave notice of a motion to amend the bye-law referring to children on the street after 9 o'clock.

Council adjourned.
