THE AMOUNT OF BRITAIN'S CLAIM

For Arrests of British Shipping is Five Millions—More Seizures Made—Russians Defeated at Ta Tche, Kiao and Evacuate New Chwang—The Vladivostock Squadron Sighted.

AMOUNT OF BRITAIN'S CLAIMS.
St. PETERSBURG, July 25—(Special)—Great Britain's claims against Russia for capture and other indemnities in connection with arrests etc., of ships are already estimated at \$5,000,000.

ORDERS TO STOP SEIZURES.

The Associated Press announces that Russia has informally notified Great Britain that orders have been issued to the Russian cruisers in the Red Sea to arrest no more merchantmen.

BATTLE OF TATCHE KIAO.

NEW CHWANG, July 25—(Special)—A battle took place on Sunday last of Tatche Kiao resulting in the Russians being driven back.

RUSSIAN SUNK BRITISH STEAMER.

The British steamer Tsinan reached Yokohama with the crew of the British esmer Knight Commander, sunk by the Vladivostock squadron of Isu.

THE PASSENGERS DETAINED.

Her cargo was general. Her European passengers were detained by the Russians and the crew transferred to the Tsinan which reports the Russians also sank two Japanese schooners.

SEIZURE OF THE ARDOVA.

SUEZ, July 25—(Special)—The British steamer Ardova, seized by the Russian volunteer steamer Smolensk has arrived here flying the Russian naval flag and with a prize crew on board.

CAPTAIN LODGES A PROTEST.

Capt. Smith of the Ardova lodged a complaint with the British Consul against the seizures.

RUSSIAN SQUADRON SIGHTED.

TOKYO, July 25—(Special)—The Vladivostock squadron was sighted 20 miles off Kalsu Ura this morning steaming slowly east.

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EVOLUTION AND FAITH WAS

Discussed by Rev. Dr. Andrews Last Night

An Admirable Lecture to which no Summary can do Adequate Justice—Officers for School.

There was a good audience to hear Rev. Dr. Andrews last evening on Evolution and Faith. He disclaimed any intention of committing the Summer School or the Methodist denomination his views on this question. He spoke for himself only, and it soon became evident that he is a believer in evolution. He proceeded in a clear and forcible argument to show how much evolution is on all hands admitted in plant and animal life, the plant, animal and all living things in each case from the single cell, and from lower forms to higher, till in man the mental was evolved from the physical and the moral and spiritual from the mental. He found no difficulty in reconciling the theory of evolution with Scripture, and thought that on the contrary it obviated many difficulties to think of God as working out his great purposes by the law of evolution. No mere synopsis could give a fair conception of the clearness and force of the speaker's argument. His discourse was at times eloquent as well. The vote of thanks was moved by Mr. Starratt and seconded by Prof. Watson in highly appreciative terms.

As a Protest Against Reduction of Wages

Another Big Strike on—Thousands of Men Leaving the Yards—Reported at Shanghai.

REPORTED AT SHANGHAI.

ANOTHER BIG STRIKE ON.

CHICAGO, July 25—(Special)—The teamsters employed by the union stock yards have struck. Every live stock handler and all the mechanics are out and thousands of men are leaving the yards.

NO DISORDER IS REPORTED.

30000 EMPLOYEES TO STAY OUT.
FALL RIVER, July 25—(Special)—An association strike order has been issued by the Fall River textile council calling for up wards of 30,000 operatives to remain away from mills this morning as a protest against the reduction of 12 1/2 per cent in the wages which became effective today.

THE RESPONSE GENERAL.

The response was as general as the labor leaders had predicted. In thirty seven mills involved in the agreement to reduce wages not more than 300 entered the gates.
