New York Stock Prices In Decline

(By Victor Eubank)
NEW YORK, March 20—(AP)—
The stock market generally backed
down today after three modest re-
covery sessions but dealers were
among the slowest in the past year
and scattered leaders managed to
remain in the plus column.
Trends wavered following a moder-
ately active opening. Losses run-
ning to 3 or more points were sub-
sequently reduced here and there.
The direction was irregularly up-
er at the close. The ticker tape
frequently was at a standstill.
Transfers of 630,000 shares compar-
ed with 780,000 the day before and
were a low for a full stretch since
Aug. 15.
The Associated Press 60-stock
composite was off 2 of a point at
64.5.
Distillers Seagram, among Can-
adian issues, reversed its early
losses and closed up 1-4. Canadian
Pacific was unchanged after los-
ing 1-8 in early trading. McIntyre
was up 1-8 following a quiet start.
Dome Mines was off 1-2. On the
Curb, Lake Shore was off 1-4 and
Giant Yellowknife eased 1-8.
Atlas Truck was up 5 1-4 points
at 27 1-2 on 100 shares. Improved
were Eastern Air Lines, United
Air Lines, Detroit Edison, Colum-
bia Gas, Standard Oil (NJ), West-
inghouse, American Smelting, In-
ternational Harvester, Philip Morris,
Owens, Illinois and Union
Carbide.
Johns-Manville yielded 3 1-2 at
122, Norfolk and Western 2 at 242
1-2, Santa Fe 1 1-4 at 87 1-4, Uni-
on Pacific 1 at 123, Du Pont 1
at 182, Corro de Pasco 1 at 32 and

Stock Prices Weak On Mt'l Exchange

MONTREAL, March 20—(CP)—
Most groups displayed fractional
weakness in continued quiet deal-
ings on the stock exchange and
curb market today. Individual is-
sues again drew bulk of the trad-
ing interest.
Montreal Power, Curb Aircraft,
Brown, St. Lawrence Corporation,
C.P.R., Seagrams and C. W. Lum-
ber were more active stocks and
accounted for about one-half of
the non-mining volume total.
Papers were down a point in the
indices with St. Lawrence Corpora-
tion the most prominent trader
and off 1-8 at 14 3-8. Brown was
unchanged, Abitibi Pfd up 1-8 and
Price 1-2 lower and Consolidat-
ed 3-8 behind. International closed
with a loss of 1-4 after an open-
ing lift.

Barn Hay Drying Experiments

(Experimental Farms News)
In 1946 experiments to test the
efficiency of barn hay drying for
Fraser Valley conditions were un-
dertaken at the Dominion Experi-
mental Farm, Agassiz, B.C. The
results of these experiments, how-
ever, are of general interest. The
method used, says M. P. Clarke of
the Farm staff, consists of plac-
ing partially cured hay over a sys-
tem of wooden ducts laid on the
mow floor and forcing a large vol-
ume of unheated air through the
mass of hay by means of a large
capacity fan until drying is com-
pleted. Those who have tried the
system recommend that the hay
be placed in a layer not exceeding
eight feet in depth after it has
been field wilted down to approx-
imately 40 per cent moisture. Sup-
porters of the method further con-
tend that by handling partially
wilted hay loss of valuable leaf is
practically eliminated and if dry-
ing is carried out properly, green
colour is retained, thus making a
high grade feed.
The Agassiz installation was
placed in a mow 30 x 36 feet and
equipped with a fan capable of de-
veloping 16,000 cubic feet of air per
minute, or approximately 15 cubic
feet per square foot of mow area
per minute. Cost of the installa-
tion, including materials, labour,
fan and electric wiring, totalled
\$586.00.
During the haying season three
trials were made. In two of these
the hay was placed directly over
the duct system. In the third the
fresh hay was placed on top of the
previously dried layer. In the three
trials the hay was field wilted down
to 45 per cent moisture or slightly
less before hauling was started. By
the time hauling was finished the
last loads were down to approxi-
mately 30 per cent moisture.
In the first experiment the hay
was definitely over-mature at time
of cutting and in the second run
rain which came immediately after
cutting, resulted in some loss of
nutrients. In both instances, how-
ever, carotene and protein content
were superior to comparable field
cured hay on the basis of chemical
analysis. The third trial was car-
ried out in good weather and pro-
duced a hay of excellent quality
from the analytical standpoint.
The mow finishing period ex-
tended between 10 to 14 days and
at the end of this period the hay
was dried down to 15-20 per cent
moisture. Field wilting from a
freshly cut moisture content of 75
per cent down to 45 per cent re-
quired 24 to 36 hours in good weath-
er. In the second trial rain in-
tervened immediately after cutting
and 72 hours were required before
the hay was ready for hauling.
The three trials produced an es-
timated total of 42.3 tons of cured
hay. The average increase in cost,
including power consumption and
depreciation on equipment, amount-
ed to \$1.70 per ton of dry hay. The
first season's results must of nec-
essary be regarded as preliminary.
It was evident that the efficiency
of the method is determined to a
large degree by weather, even af-
ter the hay is placed in the barn.
During rainy weather, drying was
slow, and vice-versa during warm,
dry days. The method appears to
offer some further measure of con-
trol over weather in hay making.
A wider range of seasonal condi-
tions and feeding trials must be
carried on with barn cured hay in
comparison with grass and clover
silage and field cured hay.
