## DISSOLUTION OF ONTARIO LEGISLATURE

### Premier Ferguson Announces Dec. 1st as Date of General Election - Cabinet Reorganized.

BULLETIN, TORONTO, Oct. 18.—Dissolution of the Ontario legislature was signed this afternoon and Premier G. Howard Ferguson announced a general election to be held on December 1st. Nomination will be held on November 20. Following a cabinet meeting this evening announcement was made from the parliament buildings that the resignation of Hon. W. F. Nickle had been accepted and that Colonel W. H. Price will succeed him in the post of attorney general. It was also announced that Hon. J. D. Monteith, member for North Perth, would be sworn in tonight as provincial treasurer succeeding Colonel Price in that position. W. F. Finlayson, Simcoe East, has already been sworn in as Minister of Lands and Forests, and Hon. David Jameson, South Grey, has been sworn in as minister without portfolio.

## Eleven Vessels Reported Wrecked

## Doherty to Act As Chief Counsel

MONTREAL, Oct. 18.—Hon. J. C. Doherty, former Canadian Minister of Justice, will sail from Montreal about the 22nd of this month to act as chief counsel for the Dominion in the hearing before the Privy Council in London of the case between Canada and Newfoundland in regard to the Labrador boundary. Mr. Doherty's decision to accept the post was delayed on account of indisposition, but his health is now much improved.

## No Danger of Annexation Prem. King Declares

LONDON, Oct. 18.—Premier Mackenzie King, of Canada, who has arrived here for the Imperial Conference, today said that there was no danger of Canada being annexed by the United States—a bogey which recently has been worrying some of the British newspapers.

The Canadian Premier, speaking to newspapermen, said that his political opponents may have raised the question of annexation during the recent election but that it was purely party politics. "It should not be taken seriously. We laugh at it," he said. The evening papers publish his statement prominently under big headlines.

## Chinese Forces Massing For Big Battle

The Canadian people deal with their own questions in their own way."

## LLOYD GEORGE "OH IRENE" IS SUCCESSFULLY PRESENTED BY LOCAL CAST

### Denies in Barnstable Speech that He Backed General Strike - Welshman Calls It Folly to Waste Energy Upon Feuds.

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—A special copyright despatch to the New York Herald-Tribune says that in his speech at Barnstable Saturday, David Lloyd George made a veiled bid for the leadership of the Liberal party as successor to the Earl of Oxford and Asquith when he called for a peace conference of the two wings of the party to end the feud which caused Lord Oxford's resignation last Thursday. The despatch says: "The wartime premier had the highest praise for the retiring leader and deplored the controversy which rent the party. Lloyd George hastened to brand as a mistake the idea that he approved of the general strike last May. "I did not approve of the general strike," he said, "I condemned it unequivocally. "His defiance of Lord Oxford's policy regarding the strike was the immediate cause of the present Liberal dispute. "Referring to Lord Oxford's resignation, Lloyd George termed him one of the most brilliant array of leaders and praised his fine intelligence, unique gifts and impressive utterances. "Calling for a united party, Lloyd George said: "It is crime to waste energy and enthusiasm on personal feuds when the nation is crying for remedies for present conditions. I will be prepared, in the spirit of amity to discuss with all who will meet me in that spirit the best methods advanced for action to advance a constructive policy adequate to the needs of the country today and worthy of the highest Liberal traditions of the past."

## Royal Party Cheered By Thousands

NEW YORK, N. Y., Oct. 18.—Queen Marie of Rumania, and her royal party stepped onto American soil at the Battery today in a drizzling rain which dampened every cheer but the spirits of the smiling visitors and the cheering thousands who crowded the great square for a glimpse of the first Queen to visit the United States since the Queen of the Belgians came, seven years ago. The Royal Party will pay unofficial visits to Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver, while on the continent.

## Emperor's Son Shows Skill In Alpine Climb

CHAMONIX, France, Oct. 18.—Prince Chichibu, second son of the Emperor of Japan, was one of thousands who gratified their desire to scale high mountains and made 1926 a banner year in Alpine climbing. The Prince proved his skill as a climber by conquering the Finsteraarhorn—the highest in the Bernese Oberland, the Gross Schreckhorn and the Matterhorn. The last ascent took place on the birthday of his father, the Mikado, and the Prince had the unusual experience of celebrating the great national Japanese festival "Tenchoseisan" on the summit of one of the highest peaks in the Alps.

## Son of Dickens Finds Name Has a Handicap

LONDON, Oct. 18.—Bearing the name of an honored celebrity is something of a handicap. When celebrating his golden wedding, Sir Henry F. Dickens, son of the novelist, said the name he bore had been an advantage to him in some ways, but in others it had been a disadvantage because people had expected so much of him. In making a presentation, Sir E. Marshall Hall said Sir Henry combined in himself all the lovable qualities of the many lovable characters created by Charles Dickens, and his father.

## BRUCE DUBBED BABY OF THE CONFERENCE

### Premier is 42 Years Old and has had a Stirring Career - Took Part in Gallipoli Offensive During War and was Twice Wounded.

LONDON, Oct. 18.—Political England already has dubbed Stanley Melbourne Bruce, Australia's youthful prime minister, the "baby of the Imperial Conference," which opens on October 19th. Mr. Bruce is 42 years old and is the youngest Premier of the British Commonwealth. His brief career has included excursions in law, athletics, business and the profession of arms as well as politics. Unlike most of his predecessors in the Australian premiership, Mr. Bruce is a native-born Australian. He was educated in England, however, at Cambridge University, and the old "grads" still recall how he helped row his varsity to victory against Oxford in 1904. Leaving school, he took a brief fling at the English bar, but left that when the war came to accept a captaincy and take part in the Gallipoli offensive, where he was twice wounded. That he was a thorough soldier is attested by the military cross and croix de guerre, which he possesses. After the war he returned to business in Australia, then entered politics. He ignored the taunts of his enemies, who charged him with being a "political amateur," and eventually achieved cabinet rank. Then came the unsought premiership. Almost at once he made his first bow to the British public as a Prime Minister when he came to England in 1923 to attend the last Imperial Conference. Mr. Bruce's hobby is golf and when he is at home he reserves one day each week for this sport.

## Cabinet to Discuss Alberta Coal Pact

OTTAWA, Oct. 18.—Cabinet ministers are returning to Ottawa after a few days spent in their own constituencies. A cabinet council is called for tomorrow afternoon. Perhaps the chief business before the council is the transportation of Alberta coal to eastern Canada, and the federal government is expected to make some announcement soon as to the extent of its assistance to this movement. Tentative plans have been submitted to provincial premiers and their replies will probably be available.

## Palmetto Tree Is Being Turned To Furniture

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 18.—The noble palmetto tree, emblematic of the state of South Carolina, is about to attain its second place in the history of the United States. This time it will be chronicled in the annals of furniture manufacturing. The tree received first historical mention as a protection for the American colonists in their defense of Fort Moultrie, where the shot from the British fleet sank harmlessly in the soft spongy logs. His attention prompted by the unique porous quality of the tree, a large industrialist acquired a 300,000 acre tract of groves and enlisted the aid of twelve laboratories of furniture companies in an attempt to apply a veneer finish.
