Radium Therapy Cures Cancer

LONDON, Dec. 6.—The report of the Medical Research Council on the medical uses of radium covering 1923 is prefaced by a declaration that eight years' investigation and supervision by the Council's radiological committee show that the general situation has been transformed. From being merely a palliative measure employable in inoperable cases, or to supplement treatment after surgery, radium therapy has become a curative and a method of primary value in several types of cancer. In some instances it is already superseding surgical procedure.

The position now is that there is scarcely any part of the body likely to be the seat of cancer for which some method of applying radium has not been devised. It is important to emphasize the sobering influence of statistical data upon the state of patients after periods of one, two, three or more years following treatment. While there is good warrant for an extended use of radium in many forms of cancer it is no less true that the general expectations of the public outrun the real probabilities.

Localized Cases.

Radium should be regarded, says the report as an agent treatment in cases of localized cancer and the more limited the region affected the greater is the chance of success. While there is good warrant for an extended use of radium in many forms of cancer it is no less true that the general expectations of the public outrun the real probabilities.

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If the cancerous growth is so limited in extent as to be called operable, then it can, in proper hands, be eradicated by the use of radium. If there has been an extension of the disease from its primary focus, which makes the case inoperable, radiation methods may still be successful, but only if the treatment is so planned that limitations of the effective zone of radiatory actions are visualized no less surely than the probably paths of extension of the disease.

In cancer of the tongue, which has been localized as a primary growth, radium treatment meets with good prospect of success. If the glands on

either side of the neck are affected radiation methods are resorted to the utmost to deal with these extensions. With wide extensions of the disease beyond the glands near the primary focus radiological methods generally fail.

Hospital Figures

Figures from St. Bartholomew's Hospital reveal that two cases of inoperable cancer of the breast, treated over four years ago, are alive and well. Three others, then considered inoperable, show no recurrence after more than one and one-half years and among inoperable cases no less than 39 cases, which have shown no recurrence after four or more years, are considered cured. In all these cases surgery alone would have been useless. Of course in the greater number of cases radium has proved unavailable, but it can be stated that the cures which have been obtained by radium would have been incurable by any other means.

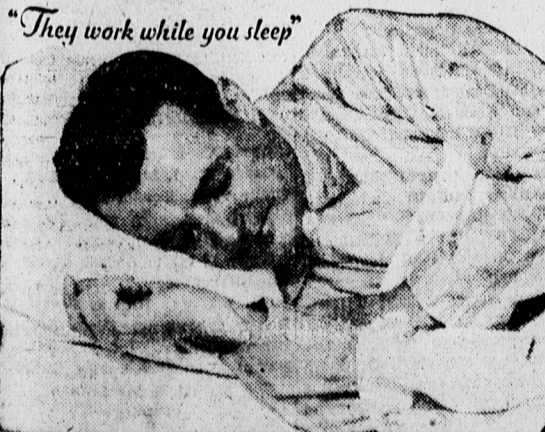
