Soviets Boost Baby Bonuses

MOSCOW, July 10 (AP) - The Soviet government is sweeping a decree to strengthen family life, today made divorce much more difficult to obtain and set a few days with his parents, ranging up to a lump sum of 5,000 rubles or 950 at birth of an 11th child. The monthly payment of 900 rubles or 97.

State aid begins with a grant of 400 rubles at birth of a third child. A fourth child brings \$247 payment and \$120 per month, with lump sums and monthly aid increasing up to 950 and 507 monthly for the 11th child and each thereafter. Monthly payments continue until children are five years of age.

The decree - causing a sensation throughout Russia - also created honors for mothers, the highest one, "Mother Heroine" for women rearing 10 or more children, revised family taxes to encourage births, tightened laws against abortionists, liberalized aid for pregnant women, and ordered increased production of baby clothes.
