## BEES AND HONEY

(L. P. Tanton.)

A land flowing with milk and honey is the description of the promised land. This is literally true of Palestine, India, Italy, and the lands of the Orient, native homes of the honey bee; where this sweet nectar flows in abundance. In scriptural times it was their national sweet for food and mixed with milk a national drink. Honey is a whole food, pre-digested, producing bone, blood, flesh and brain. In the sunny climes of the Mediterranean it is enjoyed alike by rich and poor. In this Province it is not in general use. It is probably safe to say that four fifths of P. E. Islanders have never tickled their palates by its delicious flavor and yet in the fields of Canada thousands of tons are left to go to waste ungathered and unused at almost every summer season. There is no just reason why the table of nearly every farm house in our Province should not be adorned by the beautiful flakes of comb honey and the decanter of rich golden nectar.

### THE HONEY BEE.

It is essentially a business insect. It exhibits active features at both ends. There is no objection taken to the honey gathering portion. But that which Josh Billings refers to as the "business end of the bee" no doubt accounts for the absence of the bee-hive from many a farm or lawn. When a real live bee sits down on a soft tender piece of human flesh, and with malicious intent, his seat resembles a red hot needle, but with an effect more lasting. But the bee has no malice. When it stings it is at the cost of its life, and it has too much sound sense to sacrifice a useful life for nothing. Like a true British soldier it is brave on the field of defence and uses its weapon only for the protection of home and its colonial interests. The enthusiast thinks little of the stinging and esteems the bees as his pets. It is, wonderful too how friendly you can get with your bees. On a bright sunny day the air around me alive with the busy hum of industry. I have lifted frames by frame out of my apiary handling and exposing to the light of day probably a quarter of a million of bees without protection to hands or face and without as much as a single sting. On other occasions however I have many times felt their resentment, the nature of which is never appreciated by the recipient. The operator is in such cases more to blame than the bee, which is almost invariably the outcome of hasty manipulation, or unseasonable meddling. Properly handled with proper appliances and the right breed of bees they can be kept and utilized with comparative ease and safety. An ordinary hive or colony of bees in season consists of about twenty thousand workers, a few hundred drones or male bees and one

the natural mother of the whole colony. Her sole business is to lay eggs for which she has an enormous capacity. Her ovaries are said to contain twenty-five million eggs. During the summer and swarming season a good Queen will lay over three thousand eggs daily. Thus the value of your colony depends entirely on her breed and quality. She deposits in every egg on the bottom of the cell of the ordinary honey comb. In three days this egg becomes a worm. This is then fed by the worker bees for six days and is then sealed up with a covering of wax and pollen. Twelve days after this or twenty days from the egg the fully developed

eats her way out of prison and almost at once takes up the active duties of life. For a few hours it crawls around stretching its limbs and surveying the new world. Then it becomes a nurse in the household carrying food to, and feeding the hatching brood and attending to the minor duties of home life. When a week old it comes out into the sunshine takes its first flight in the open air and probably explores the scenes of its future activity. After the second week she sails forth into the great fields of active labor, visiting the wild flowers of field and forest and gathering the sweet nectar which stored and ripened becomes the rich delicious honey of our breakfast table.

In human life it is often our privilege to see in winter's discontent with the fruits gathered in summer's sunshine. Not so with the tireless industrious bee. Six weeks or two months of hard labor in the honey flow wears out her wings and limbs and she dies, not of old age, but like an old machine from wear and tear. Thus she enjoys not the harvest reaped for her successors. The succeeding fall or autumn bee is longer lived. I have had bees in my apiary to live over winter for nine months. The fall bee has no exhausting work to perform. Her job is to keep the hive ventilated and warm in winter, to feed the few bees that are raised in cold weather, and in early spring to repeople the hive with a large stock of young brood. After providing for a new population and getting them started fairly on the road to success.

she dies without partaking of the rich golden harvest of summer.

### THE DRONE

or male bee is safe to handle. He has no sting and might be too lazy to use it if he had. They are sometimes too lazy to even feed themselves. I have seen the drone lying pitifully on its back on a frame of comb and the worker bee feeding it like a helpless infant. He is slow from the egg for even that takes twenty four days on its back on a frame of comb. Most of their time is spent in the hive living upon the honey gathered by the diligent little workers. In the heat and sunshine of midday they fly out for a constitutional or appetizer. In the fall after the season of increase is over they are all destroyed and carried away by the worker bees. The drone is a very large and handsome bee and on the wing makes more noise than any of his clan. There are also hundreds of species of

### RACES OF BEES.

Ranging from the small Malpines of South America to the giant Apis Dorsata of India. The race most familiar here is the Black or German bee. There is also Cyprian a cross of the Holy Land Egyptian, Caucasian and Carniolian, some very vicious, and some very mild, and all adopted to a greater or lesser extent on the American continent. The popular bee and the one rapidly superceding all others on this side of the Atlantic is the

### ITALIAN BEE.

It is one of the most gentlest and most easily handled of all breeds. When opening the hives and removing the frames they stick to the comb and attend to their work regardless of the interruption. The tongue of the Italian is also longer and they reach into the honey sac of red clover where other races of shorter tongue will fail. They are better able to protect their stores from robbers, for when honey is scarce bees will rob each other. In addition they are very handsome banded with a beautiful golden yellow, are good to winter in our climate and good honey collectors.

### THE BEE HIVE.

Of modern times is as far in advance of the ancient lox or straw skep as the arc light is ahead of the tallow dip. The old method of smothering the bees with brimstone and tearing the skep to pieces to get the honey is relegated to ancient history with the newest hives every portion of the colony can be handled and inspected almost anytime. There are many styles designed, but the one in popular use is either the Langstroth or one adopted to the Langstroth or one adopted to the size of 12 x 18 x 10 inches inside measure. This contains eight frames into which the honey comb is built. These frames are moveable and can be lifted out, bees, honey and all for examination. There are various patterns of frames also—a description of which could be more adapted to a professional bee keeper than the amateur for whom I am now writing for

### SUPER

or superfluous honey box also made in various designs. The comb honey super is usually made half the width of the main hive but of the same outward dimension. Into these twenty-four small boxes 4 1/2 x 4 1/2 x 1 1/2 inches all are placed. A separator or dividing slat is put between each row of boxes to keep the combs straight and prevent the bees building from one box into the other. This fits closely on top of the brood chamber or main hive. When the bees get their downy apartment nicely filled they move up into this super. When they fill those boxes with those beautiful white combs that look so attractive and taste so nice. All honey stored above the main hives is usually considered as surplus and is gradually appropriated by the bee keeper.

For liquid or extracted honey a larger sized super is used and no small honey boxes. Another hive of the same size as the main hive, with the same eight full sized frames is most frequently used. A few however have slightly smaller boxes and honey are taken out, the bees brushed or shaken back into the hive, the honey cells are uncapped with a specially made uncapping knife and placed in an
