THE PACING BRIGADE

If the nominations to the early closing events for pacers is an indication of the number of lateral gaited horses which will be seen on the mile tracks this year, the fields at a few of the meetings will be rather light. Of the top liners, Napoleon Direct is slated for a return trip in Geers stable, the other members of his outfit being Betty Blacklock and Goldie Todd, the latter being considered very promising.

In event of Napoleon Direct standing the preparation required of a two minute performer, a renewal of the battles between him and the other free for allers, which include Single G, Miss Harris M., William, Ben Earl, Roan Hal, and Russel Boy, would undoubtedly put the pacers in the spot light, as the other available material also includes that splendid race horse Directum J. Ua, Verlie Patchen, Peter Nash, Lillian T., and whatever others may filter down from the class events.

Since the close of last season, Murphy has sold Oro Fino, The Problem and Budlight to parties who will race them over the half-mile tracks, while Zombrino was dropped before the end of the season. At present he has in addition to Directum J., the Direct Hal pacer Direct C. Burnett with a mark of 2:07 1/4, Ethel Chimes, that whisked around the track at Springfield, Ill. in 2:06 1/4, the Long Island bred mare Esther R., and Sanarado. The latter has never held the bell ring but as he paced the Syracuse track in 2:02 1/4 last fall he is very apt to be able to give a good account of himself. Direct C. Burnett was bred by E. T. Bedford at Green Farms, Conn., and made his record at Janesville, Wis. His dam, Alice Mapes, made a pacing record of 2:06 1/4, while he is also a brother to Hal Mapes, 2:07 3/4. E. T. Bedford bred Hamburg Belle, 2:01 1/4, the trotter that made the world's race record, and if all the reports are true this horse may be fore the close of the season equal or reduce the world's race record for pacers, which is now held by Directum I.

Valentine, as usual, has a bunch of pacers, his collection this year including Ua, reported to be in top form. Baronwood, Flora A., Omoneid with which he won several good races last year, Gladys B., and Gold Quartz. Cox is coming back with the regulars Little Mattie, that formidable cripple A Game of Chance which took them all into camp at Cleveland last year, the rejuvenated R. H. Brett, Esther Knight, Florence Peters, and the handsome pony Frank Dewey. The latter made the rounds in the Bay State Circuit last year and flashed in a heat at Readville in 2:03 1/4 just to show the Grand Circuit folks what a half-miler could do when cut loose. Peter Look is rated as the star in McMahon's pacing outfit. He failed to win at Cleveland and Toledo last year but a different story is expected this season. His stable companions are Symbol Baron and Belle Alcantara. The latter carries the Indian sign. Last year she won ten out of fourteen races, Verlie Patchen, Oro Fino and Betsey Hamlin being the only horses that finished in front of her. Belle Alcantara started her turf career with a victory at the Cleveland July meeting, when she paced in 2:07 1/4. She also won three races at Columbus meetings, two at Seelala and Lexington, and one at Hamline and Atlanta. Her record of 2:04 1/4 was made at Columbus while she paced in 2:04 1/2 at Lexington. The McMahon pacers were given their final work at Indianapolis, where McDonald prepared Ethel Knight, and Palla, Troy, Verlie Patchen, Captain Mack, Mowrer Boy, Eva Abba, Crescent Knight and Admiral to a feather edge before opening the season on the northern Ohio half-mile tracks.

Leese has two pacers to depend on, one being the green horse Seraskin, and the other and the clever Northern Man colt Edward P. The South Bend trainer Sturgeon has three, of which South Bend Girl was seen in the fastest company last season. His other pupils are Double G., who was held over after going a few races, and the mare Grace Direct, which won a splendid race at Atlanta last October. The latter also won her first race this season over the half-mile track at Findlay, Ohio, the last week in May in 2:06 1/4, with Earl Backup, her stable mate South Bend Girl finishing second and also winning a heat in 2:08 1/4.

W. Fleming, whose last appearance in the Grand Circuit was behind that sterling performer Joe Patchen II, is this year busy with the Forest Farm horses, which include the pacers Miss Harris M., the DeForest pair Tommy and ex, and the recent purchase Darvester, that is engaged at almost all of the leading meetings. As Braden Direct has been retired, Fred Egan comes back this year with Baroness Edgewood, Royal Earl, Abbe Dryad, and Bingon Direct, while Fred Edmunds has Highland Lass, as well as Peter Nash and Al Whitney, the red bearer, and the handsome black mare Lillian T.

Fred Ward, one of the California visitors, has four pacers, their names being O. U. C. Peddler Direct, Emma M., and Harry Mac, while Townsend from Fresno will race J. C. L., Roy Owen has come across the Mississippi with the Oregon bred horse Gray Hal by Hal B., and Helen Chimes, while Jay Mack will be raced this year by Ben Whitehead. McDonald and Cox each had him a season and while he had 2:04 speed, they always found a neighbor with a little more. Possibly Ben can place him where he will win.

Like Joe Patchen, that rugged pony Single G., has done well under the training and driving of a number of reinmen. Starting off with Vickery in his three year old form, he passed the following year to Gosnell. When he died, Cox, Jamison, and Geers were seen behind him and Ed Allen will take him to the races this year. After three weeks on the half-mile tracks he will be seen with his stable companion Hal J. on the larger ovals. The latter was off last year but is now considered ready for a trip in the fast classes.

Among the other stables, the names of Dan Hodgwood, Edna Early, Peter Pepper, Clyde Dillon, Gratton Royal, Wellington Direct, and Grace Elder appear. As a number of the above cannot fail to go amiss before the season is over, the half-mile tracks may be levied on for a few renewals before the Grand Circuit caravan turns west from Readville. A number can also be expected to come in through the late closing purses just as Verlie Patchen, Baroness Edgewood, John R. Braden, Rascaal and Barlight until he bumped a knee did last year.
