PEOPLE'S THEATRE

Most of the screen stories last night were no food for babes, but they were such as held the closest attention of the large audiences who turned out to both houses. Warren Kerrigan in "The Storm," a two-part drama, gave a powerful rendering of the part of a young man who is the son of a man who has sworn to avenge the sin of his bygone years. Even the tragic discovery of his fiancée's relationship to his enemy does not turn him from his life's aim. The climax is a powerful one. "The Woman," a strong drama in which Jesse L. Belasco and David Belasco collaborate in a splendid picture of a Belasco masterpiece, by William C. DeMille, kept the strained attention of the audience through five reels. The cast is a strong and talented one. The story is an intricate one of Washington political life. The party in power is menaced by a powerful Opposition led by Standish. The discovery of a discreditable past threatens to crush Standish and his policy. The noble efforts of a young telephone girl whose sympathies are aroused go far to foil the calculations of the political bosses. The Standish party finally triumphs. The plot is subtly worked out and the scenes of political life are cleverly depicted. A welcome relief was Billy Ritchie in "Married on Credit." He and his rival's inability to produce the necessary two bucks lead to a tremendous amount of trouble and fun with gas-bags cans, revolvers, drains and manholes.
