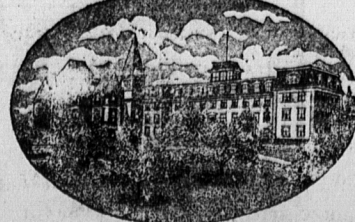

—Many Guardian readers will learn with regret of the death of Major Wright, Centerville, which occurred yesterday evening about five o'clock after an illness of only a few days. The deceased was 77 years of age and had conducted business in Centerville for forty years retiring a few years ago. His wife, nee Miss Ada Shreve, daughter of the late Rev. Mr. Shreve, Centerville, N. S. predeceased him a little over a year ago, and a few weeks afterwards his daughter, M. J., passed away. One daughter, Mrs. Millicent, and one son, R. Chmond, survive. The latter at present is on his way home from Vancouver, B. C. The Guardian extends sympathy to the bereaved family.

—A regular meeting of the West Prince Board of Trade was held in the Tignish Hall on Wednesday with the President A. J. McFayden in the chair. The general routine was gone through, and report from the delegates who attended the Maritime Board of Trade was heard. The urgent need of having Tignish Harbour dredged so as to accommodate more boats was then discussed. This is not merely a local grievance but effects the Nova Scotia and Caracraft fishermen who frequent our shores so much of late years as well; and they are entering in this matter too. Petitions have been circulated among those interested in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick and has upwards of 2,000 names attached asking the Minister of Marine to have the harbor dredged during the coming season. The Board passed a resolution urging a survey of the "run" at once so that the dredging could be begun in the early spring.

### HINTS FOR PANCAKE MAKING.

A good way to prepare the pan for pancakes, fritters and such things, is to put the butter in the clean cloth, and rub the little bundle all over the pan. The heat, melting the butter, will see just enough through the cloth to butter evenly and prevent waste for the pancakes themselves, there is an increasing use of B. ended flour, which, good cooks agree, is without an equal for making light, tasty pancakes. 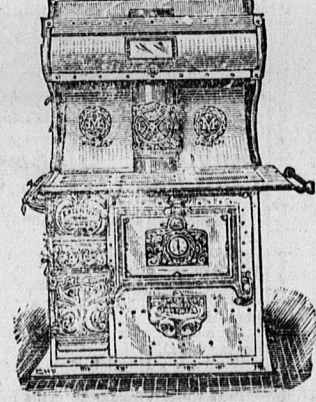
