Archibald McNeill, generally known as Capt. Archibald, died very suddenly of heart trouble in Quincy, Mass., on the 15th inst. He was a native of Little Sands, P. E. I. and was 56 years of age. He was buried in Mount Wollaston Cemetery, Quincy, on the 17th inst. The funeral service was held at the residence of Mr. William McInnis, granite polisher, 7 Kidder St. Quincy, in whose employ the deceased labored for some time. The Rev. Dr. Todd of the Presbyterian church officiated. The deceased was strictly honest and notably mindful of the poor. The floral tributes from his fellow workmen and others, spoke of the esteem in which he was held.

On Sunday 13th inst. re-opening services were conducted in the Methodist Church at Birch Grove, Freeport. Rev. Geo. F. Dawson M. A., Chairman of the Summerisle District preached in the afternoon and Rev. Mr. Whidden, Presbyterian, of Bedeque in the evening. Both services were much enjoyed by the large congregation present. The choir had prepared special music for the occasion and did their part very acceptably. Miss Annie Rogers presided at the organ. Improvements to the value of nearly \$150. have been made on the church which with its recent additions makes a very comfortable place of worship. A chancel for the accommodation of the choir has been constructed and new carpet, chairs, etc. have been added. The people of the Freeport church and congregation have contributed liberally towards these improvements and the amount of indebtedness at present is quite small. The collections taken at the re-opening services amounted to nearly \$25.

DIED at his home Tignish, Sept. 8th after a lingering illness which he bore with patience and resignation to the holy will of God, with his senses unto the last moment John Carter, relict of the late Alice Kickham at the advanced age of 87 years. Deceased was born in Flagmount, Parish of Gouran, County Kilkenny, Ireland 24th June 1816. He immigrated to this country in the barque Eagle of Waterford. He arrived in Charlottetown 28th June 1842 and shortly after his arrival he entered into business with Andrew Duncan with whom he remained for four years. Thence he removed to Miscouche where he did a thriving business for himself where he remained for several years. Afterwards he removed to Tignish where he resided up to his death. Deceased was a man who was highly esteemed and respected by everybody. He was a kind and affectionate father. He leaves to mourn six sons and five daughters, 44 grandchildren, 33 great-grandchildren. The sons are James T. farmer, Bathurst, N. B.; Edward H. horse collar manufacturer, Charlottetown, P. E. I.; Charles D. employe in P. E. I.; Lawrence W. employe B. C. R. Rail Road; John F. Grand Pacific Rail Road; Albin B. building contractor, Boston. The daughters are Mrs. C. A. Brown, Roxbury, Mass.; L. Murphy, Kensington; Mrs. E. Noonan, Palmer Road; Mary A. Boston; Margaret A. Charlottetown. The remains were taken to St. Simon and St. Jude's church, Tignish where a requiem Mass was celebrated by Rev. Dugald M. McDonald P. P. assisted by Rev. H. J. McDougall. After Mass the remains were laid to rest in the catholic cemetery beside his wife and brother. The pall-bearers were James McLoane, John J. McLellan, H. D. McLellan, A. J. Gaudet, Peter Kinch and Theodora Bernard. (Island and Boston papers please Copy.)

Inspector Carter of St. John leaves on return this morning. Mr. Carter has given valuable assistance at the Teachers' Convention.

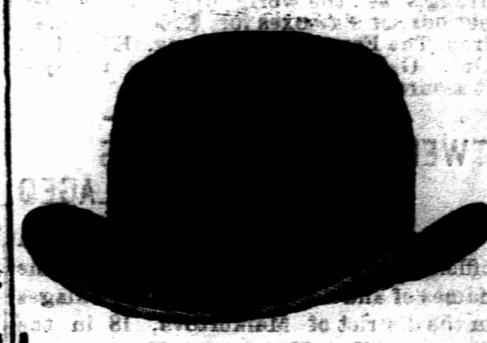
J. B. Crosby who has been visiting his old home at Bonshaw, intends leaving on return to Denver, Colorado, in about a week's time.
