MILITARY REVIEW.—The numbers of troops to participate in the big military review that will take place in Charlottetown during the Confederation Celebration, according to the intimation received by the local military authorities, will be roughly about 1,850 and not two thousand as stated in yesterday's Guardian. Also there is some correction to be made regarding the numbers of the respective units. The local troops, the Light Horse, Fourth Artillery and 82nd Infantry regiments and No. IX. Field Ambulance Corps will parade in the strengths stated yesterday; the same with regard to the 78th Highlanders from Pictou. But the 62nd Regiment, of St. John, N.B., will only send a detachment of 100 n. c. o.'s and men with seven officers, and its regimental band (25 strong); while from Halifax will come a detachment from the Royal Canadian Regiment, also a hundred strong with seven officers, and the R. C. R. Band (23 men and one officer). Of the 1,850 about 1,180 will be the number of the P. E. I. units on parade.

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
