

NEGRO RIOTING DISTURBS CUBA

Five Thousand Blacks, in Arms. Military Force Sent to Surround Them

(Canadian Press.) SAN DIAGO, May 22—The situation in Cuba is rapidly becoming more serious. It is now estimated that more than 5,000 negroes have taken up arms in the province of Oriente.

(Canadian Press.) HAVANA, May 22—Further reinforcements consisting of two companies of infantry and two batteries of artillery entrained this morning for the province of Oriente.

(Canadian Press.) They will assist the government troops already in that district who number more than 1,200 men in a movement to surround the negro insurgents under General Evaristo Eastenoz and General Iveton, who are reported at El Caney, El Cobre and San Luis, in the vicinity of Santiago.

(Canadian Press.) The Government has not received any further advice from the disturbed districts since yesterday.

CONDUCTOR IS DYING FROM HIS INJURIES

(Canadian Press.) PORT KANONIS, May 22—Jim Foley, for eleven years a conductor on the C. N. R., and one of the best known railway men in the west, lies at the point of death from injuries received at Rainy River when he slipped while attempting to board a freight train.

(Canadian Press.) TORONTO, May 21—The preliminary hearing in the four charges of fraud preferred against Dr. F. Beattie, in connection with returns made to the Minister of Finance, from the Farmers Bank while Dr. Nesbitt was president, probably will take place before police magistrate Denison on Tuesday of next week.

(Canadian Press.) It is expected that the conference will be held at the office of Attorney William A. Morse, who was Richeson's Counsel. (Canadian Press.) WOMAN MURDERED. BOSTON, May 21—Mrs. Lillian Jewar, a widow 30 years old, who is said to have come here recently from Montreal, was found murdered in her apartment in the South End yesterday. Her nostrils were stuffed with string, her mouth choked with a kimono, a towel was tightly tied about her neck and there were bruises on her head. According to Medical Examiner Leary the woman had been dead since Friday.

NEWSPAPERS OF ITALY ARE VERY BITTER

(Canadian Press.) ROME, May 22—Italian newspapers are very bitter today in connection with what is termed the deplorable decision of the Turkish government to expel Italians.

(Canadian Press.) The Messaggero calls it the vengeance of barbarians and says it is contrary to all international law. The Vico says Turkey is mistaken if she thinks she will be able to stop Italy by a violent decree and states "We have replied by seizing Crete and shall continue."

THE DISPOSAL OF THE BODY OF C.V.T. RICHESON

(Canadian Press.) BOSTON, May 22—The funeral of C. V. T. Richeson, who was electrocuted yesterday for the murder of Avis Linnell, took place in the vestry of the Warren Ave. Baptist church.

(Canadian Press.) Rev. Herbert S. Johnson, who was one of Richeson's spiritual advisers up to the moment of electrocution and who is the pastor of the church, conducted the services.

(Canadian Press.) Less than a score were present. No information was given as to the disposal of the body.

(Canadian Press.) BOSTON, May 22—The body of Clarence V. T. Richeson who was executed in the electric chair at the State Prison in Charlestown early yesterday for the murder of Avis Linnell, lay at North Grove Street Morgue last night.

(Canadian Press.) Earlier in the day Dr. George B. McGrath, Medical Examiner of Suffolk Co., performed the autopsy required by law in the case of executed murderers and declared that Richeson's brain was normal.

(Canadian Press.) Douglas Richeson, of Chicago, brother of dead man, was undecided regarding the disposal of the remains and the matter will be settled today.

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BRITISH MINERS IN CONFERENCE

(Canadian Press.) LONDON, May 22—The national conference of the Miner's Federation which has been meeting this week to discuss the operation of the recently enacted minimum wages act for miners, adjourned today after passing a resolution which indicates that the men are spoiling for another fight.

AGAINST SPIRIT OF MILITARISM

(Canadian Press.) VANCOUVER, May 22—The British Columbia Methodist Conference at Victoria last night passed a resolution against the encouragement of a spirit of militarism throughout Canada.

MINISTER DISMISSED

(Canadian Press.) TORONTO, May 21—The case against Rev. J. D. Morrow, charged with marrying a white girl and a Chinaman after ten o'clock at night, was dismissed in the Police Court this morning, the Magistrate holding that there was not sufficient proof that the ceremony had been performed after the hour named in the Act.

STEAMER WRECKED

(Canadian Press.) BARBADOS, May 21—The British freight steamer Lord Landsdowne, which left Norfolk, on May 12, for this port was wrecked today during a misty gale to the east of this city. Her total loss is possible. All on board are safe.

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NEWFOUNDLAND STILL DESIRES INDEPENDENCE

(Canadian Press.) OTTAWA, May 22—The attitude of Newfoundland towards federation with Canada is expressed by Sir Ralph Williams, governor of the colony as that of a man doing well in a small way who refuses the overtures of a rich neighbor because he prefers his own independence.

(Canadian Press.) Sir Ralph is here from Toronto where he met the Duke of Connaught. He would not discuss the question of reciprocity between Newfoundland and the United States but said personally he was glad the pact was defeated in Canada.

TWO DIFFERENT OPINIONS ON TAFT'S CHANCES

(Canadian Press.) WASHINGTON, May 22—Director McKinley of the Taft National Campaign Bureau today issued a statement declaring that the President would have at least 600 delegates in the Chicago convention as he is already assured of the control of that body by a large majority.

(Canadian Press.) WASHINGTON, May 22—Senator Dixon, head of the Roosevelt National Headquarters, today issued a statement practically calling on President Taft to withdraw from the Presidential contest.

NESBITT'S TRIAL ADJOURNED

(Canadian Press.) TORONTO, Ont., May 21—There is a possibility of Toronto having the first military aviation company in Canada. While no official step has been taken in the matter, it has been suggested to the Department of Militia at Ottawa, by an officer of one of the local corps, that such a company might be organized in Toronto with "Casey" Baldwin and J. A. D. McCurdy, the Canadian aviators, as two of the chief officers.

RIPPED UP TRACK.

(Canadian Press.) PORT WAYNG, Ind., May 21—To the strains of music furnished by the village band one hundred Erie Railroad section men under direction of their officials ripped one and one-quarter miles of track from the roadbed of the Cincinnati, Bluffton & Chicago Railroad at Marke and Uniondale, near here.

(Canadian Press.) HAVANAH, May 21—General Evaristo Estenoz, one of the Liberal leaders and General Iveton are directing the movements of the negro insurgents in the Province of Oriente, where the movement has become mysterious, according to despatches received by the Government this morning.

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NEW USE FOR MINES.

OTTAWA, May 21—The post office department has issued an order to postmasters warning them against a fraud alleged to have been perpetrated by some business houses and companies by which the service has been out of considerable revenue.

Three Leading Suffrage Agitators Must Spend Nine Months In Prison

LONDON, May 22—Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, militant suffragette leader, and Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Lawrence, joint editors of "votes for Women," were pronounced guilty at the Old Bailey sessions today and each sentenced to nine months imprisonment on a charge of conspiracy and inciting their followers to do malicious damage to property.

EVIDENCE ON THE ICEBERG AT INQUIRY

(Canadian Press.) LONDON, May 22—That the iceberg with which the Titanic collided was one of those of which she had warnings from other ships is the conclusion reached by the Board of Trade Court of Inquiry after a careful examination of the wireless telegrams which passed to and from the steamer on the day of the disaster.

PELLETIER HAS NOT TENDERED RESIGNATION

(Canadian Press.) OTTAWA, May 21—"Entirely imaginative and without foundation. First I have heard of it." Premier Borden tonight gave the above emphatic reply to a story circulated industriously in Montreal and Ottawa today that Hon. L. P. Pelletier had tendered his resignation as post-

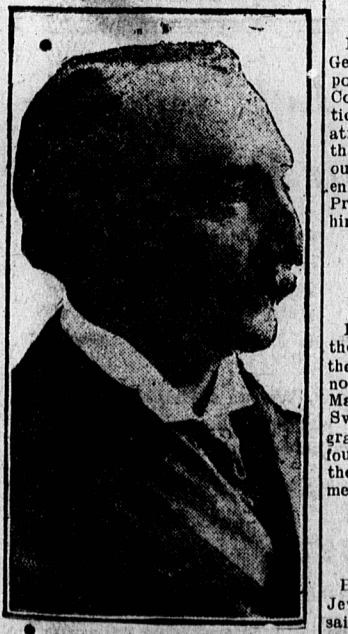


HON. L. P. PELLETIER.
