**BARRAGE FIRE.**

The above term often appears in war reports. There are doubtless many readers to whom the term is unfamiliar. Barrage fire means the concentration of fire at a certain point behind the line of trenches to be attacked to prevent the enemy in the advance trenches from retreating or securing aid from troops sent forward to reinforce them. In a narrow strip to the rear of the enemy's trenches shells fall on the appointed area so continuously that no organized body of men can pass through the curtain of fire and retain its formation, and few individuals are able to make their way through. A double barrage means that in addition to the curtain of fire between the first line trench and the supporting trenches another is thrown to the rear of the supporting trenches, thus interposing two obstacles in the advance of reinforcements or the retreat of the attacking infantry. The capture of many thousands of prisoners by the Allies in recent battles has been due in large measure to the prodigious use of ammunition in encircling the enemy with barrages of artillery fire on a scale never before attempted.

Enver Pasha, the leader of the Young Turks, Halli Bay said, called in the Armenian patriarch one day and told him the same thing, but despite this he said, the Armenians rose when the Russians invaded Asia Minor, and the Turkish Government took the measures which had been outlined to the Armenian leaders beforehand.

"The Turkish Foreign Minister said it impossible to confine the steps taken against the Armenians in a single locality in rebellion, because the organization was so perfect that only a sweeping measure at the first hint of an uprising could meet the situation.

"I will say," continued Halli Bey, "that the loss to the Ottoman Empire through the deportation of the Armenians has been immense. The Armenians are able and industrious, therefore, valuable in the economic scheme, but what could be done? We were at war and obliged, therefore, to employ every means to make secure our own position, which was betrayed so basely through our confidence.

**THE NEW GERMAN WAR LOAN OF TWELVE BILLION MARKS PASSES THE REICHSTAG.**

LONDON, Oct. 27.—The Reichstag has passed the new German war credit bill through the third reading, according to a Reuter dispatch from Amsterdam. Count Von Roedern, the Imperial treasurer, the dispatch adds, in moving the credit of 12,000,000,000 marks estimated that the total expenditure of all the belligerents has been 250,000,000,000 marks exclusive of goods destroyed, of which one-third falls to the share of Germany and her allies. The monthly German expenditure, Count Von Roedern stated, has reached about 2,187,000,000 marks, owing to the extension of the fronts into Transylvania and Dobruja.

BERLIN, October 27.—A new war credit bill for twelve billion marks was submitted to the Reichstag today by Count Von Roedern, secretary of the Imperial treasury, who also reviewed the successes of the German war finances, and compared them with the practices followed by the countries opposed to Germany.

Count Von Roedern stated that the total German war credit up to now amounted to fifty-two billion marks. Count Von Roedern said the subscription to the fifth loan had amounted to 10,652,000,000 marks. He said that the number of subscribers was about 4,000,000, and therefore the fifth war loan must be called a "people's loan."

Count Von Roedern stated that payments on the fifth war loan, the first instalment of which was due on October 18, had today reached 8,500,000,000 marks. He said that less 3 per cent of the amount paid in had been subscribed by loan institutes. Much credit for the success of the war, he asserted, was due to the increase of the saving capacity of the German people. During the first eight months of 1916, saving banks showed increases of 1,710,000,000 marks, is deposits, exclusive of the amounts subscribed in the war loan.

The Imperial treasurer then compared Germany's system of obtaining new capital with that used in Great Britain, declaring that the discount rate of the Bank of England had been fixed at six per cent, while the German Reichsbank had been able to maintain a five per cent standard since December 1914.
