(5) The Presbyteries be enjoined to consider and deal with the matter of statistics and finance as set forth in report to the assembly at the first ordinary meeting after the minutes of the assembly have been printed, and distributed, or as soon thereafter as possible, with a view to ascertain the increase or decrease in the several congregations, what congregations, if any, failed to report or have not contributed to all the schemes of the church.

The death of young men studying for the Presbyterian ministry and the needs and opportunities of the west were the burden of the discussion arising out of the reports from the various colleges.

In presenting the report of the Halifax college, Rev. Dr. John McMillan said the colleges were the backbone of the church, as without them it would be impossible to get home and foreign missionaries of numbers for the regular churches.
