—Mr. S. Kennedy Sr. and his son S. of Charlottetown paid a visit to O'Leary on Tuesday.—W.

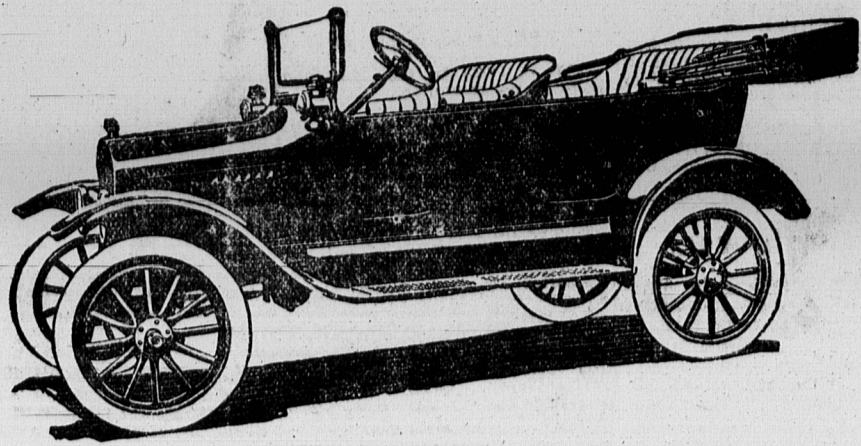
—Miss Jennie Bowness, teacher of Hampshire school spent her Easter holidays at her home in Kensington.

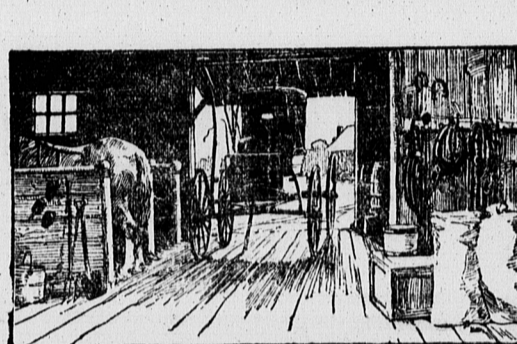

King Edward Hotel in Halifax Damaged One Life Lost

HALIFAX, April 1.—The King Edward Hotel building, on Barrington and North streets, was damaged by fire Saturday morning to the extent of \$20,000 or \$25,000 and one man, Albert Ward, of the Reconstruction staff, who was in the south basement, where the fire started, was reported missing. The smoke was so dense and fire so stubborn in that particular portion of the building that it was hours before the firemen

Origin of the Blaze.

That part of the basement in the south portion of the building immediately under the office had been for some time occupied by the men of a district reconstruction staff of workmen as an office and workshop and they were about work there when the fire started in their midst. The exact origin is not definitely known but that there was a light explosion seems a certainty. Some of the reconstruction men think it was a can of liquid tar cement that may have been near the stove that exploded. Smoke in plenty and flame followed instantly and the men ran for the windows and doors. The district superintendent of the men, Mr. Ward, called to his father, Albert Ward, who could not be located, to warn him, but because of the smoke and flame could not see where

Half Its Value.

The value of the building independent of its furnishings, etc., was probably \$50,000 and the loss by damage to the building is at least half its value.

Mr. Ward's Body Found.

Mr. Ward's body was recovered at about 12.45 Saturday.
