MEAT INSPECTION

Sir,—The Government inspection of meats in this city is a subject which has been discussed more or less spasmodically now for several years, but so far with very little practical result. As the only establishment here which packs and markets all its meat products under permanent Government inspection, we have watched with sympathetic interest the efforts made from time to time to arouse public opinion to some realization of the necessity of such oversight elsewhere. We have endeavored in any way we are allowed to be prepared for human consumption, and guaranteeing further that the product from healthy animals is prepared under the most sanitary conditions possible.

Realizing fully, as we do from practical experience, the great necessity—one might almost say, the vital necessity—of such inspection; observing how much of our meat and products go to the condemned tank in the ward appearances in good condition, but really affected with tuberculosis or other disease. When one has observed this from year to year, it is not difficult to sympathize with those who are making a well-meant, but so far futile, effort to rouse the public from their lethargy, and bring our people to realize what Government inspection really means to all concerned.

For reasons that will be evident to many, but which in any case need not be dwelt on here, we have published consistently from thrusting our ideas forward, or taking any part whatsoever in the various discussions, public or private, above referred to. But certain statements alleged to have been made at a meeting of the Board of Health on Monday evening, and published by you this morning, call for at least some slight attention, and a request for further elucidation on the part of those responsible.

According to your report:—"Mr. Justice Fitzgerald, in a brief and eloquent address, brought to the attention of the Board the fact that some days ago the President of the Anti-Tuberculosis Society was informed that the carcass of a pig had been taken down from the cold storage for the purpose of being shipped. It was examined and rejected as decidedly diseased meat, but was afterwards taken to the Market Square and sold. A carcass of beef which was refused shipment was similarly disposed of in the city. His Lordship pointed out the fatal consequences of such a practice and said it was a disgrace to the city of Charlottetown that such a state of affairs should exist."

To begin with, there is only one establishment in this Province, let alone in this city, popularly known and referred to as "The Cold Storage." True, there are other packing-houses, butcher shops and such places where the provision of low temperature is secured by the means of ice. In a strictly technical sense this too is "cold storage," but in actual practice the term so far as we are aware, is applied only where such temperatures are maintained through the process of mechanical refrigeration. And in Prince Edward Island such equipment is to be found only in the plant of The Island Cold Storage Co., Ltd., at Charlottetown.

With the operation of that firm the business of Davis & Fraser is closely associated, although conducted separately. The managing partner of Davis & Fraser, Halifax, Mr. J. F. Fraser, being also founder and President of the Island Cold Storage Co., while the general manager of the latter is Mr. J. S. Co., with head office at Charlottetown, and also manager for P. E. Island for Davis & Fraser.

This should be borne clearly in mind when a gentleman whose word carries so much weight makes the statement quoted above with reference to the rather perfunctory deliberations of the Board of Health, we have substantial reason for believing that the public understand—or rather, misunderstand—that Davis & Fraser are the people guilty of the misdemeanour named.

This is an inference altogether unjustified, and for which there is absolutely no foundation in fact. The operations of both Davis & Fraser and The Island Cold Storage Co., are conducted under the constant supervision of a thoroughly qualified Veterinary Inspector. He is placed there, and paid, by the Dominion Government, absolutely independent of, and having no financial relations whatever, with the firm or firms, whose packing operations he supervises, so far as requirements of health and sanitation are concerned. The present Inspector-in-charge, Dr. C. J. Fensfield, is a thoroughly qualified Inspector and discharges his duties, as all who have met him in the establishment will attest, without fear or favor, just to everyone, partial to none, conducting his work in regular consultation with the Provincial Inspector, Dr. W. H. Pethick, it goes without saying that all inspection is thoroughly conducted, leaving no room for even the faintest shadow of a doubt as to its efficiency.

That any carcass, or portion of a carcass, of meat, showing the slightest taint or trace of being diseased, or unfit for food should ever be allowed to leave the building is beyond the comprehension of anyone familiar with the procedure there. Until meat has actually been delivered the Inspector has no jurisdiction; for instance, he would not go to a farmer's team and officially examine and condemn a carcass. But once it comes inside the door the Inspector's control is absolute. The glands and other portions are examined minutely for any vestige of disease; healthy meat is stamped indelibly with the establishment number, in our case No. 59, coupled with the legend, "Canada Approved." Meat of suspicious quality is at once either marked with a "Hold" tag for further examination, or labelled, "Condemned." All such condemned meat is held by the Inspector in a special apartment under lock and key, and subsequently sent to the tank, to be converted into soap grease, fertilizer, and such inedible products. Immediately on being placed in the "Condemned" tank, the lid is sealed with a Government stamp; the contents are then cooked, but cannot be removed

The Inspectors are resident here, and cannot be substituted what we have stated. 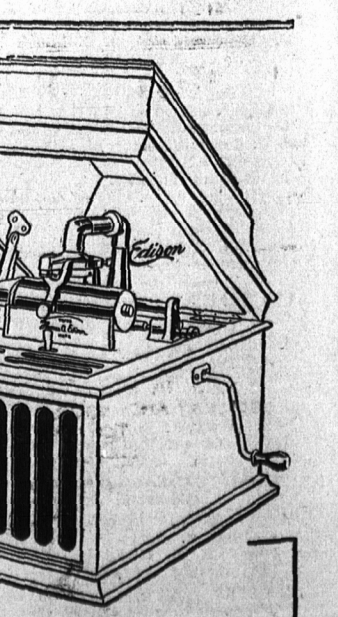
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
