TUESDAY, APRIL 12.

Hon. Mr. Hughes presented to the House a petition from the officers and members of the Prince Edward Island Dental Society praying for an act to amend the "Prince Edward Island Dental Act." A bill in accordance was introduced, read a first time and referred to the private bill committee.

Mr. Mathieson asked the Commissioner of Agriculture to lay on the table of the House the correspondence or a copy thereof between the Department of Agriculture and Dewar relative to the sale of certain stock by the Department of Agriculture to the said John A. Dewar.

The Commissioner said a copy would be laid on the table.

Mr. Mathieson asked the Hon. the Leader of the Government to lay on the table of this House all papers and correspondence (if copies thereof) between this Government and the Dominion Government relative to the claim of this Province to a share in the Fishery Award, or relative to any other claims which this Province has against the Dominion Government.
