

MEETING OF GRAND LODGE I.O.G.T.

The Grand Lodge, I. O. G. T., of P. E. Island met on Thursday last in conjunction with Dawn of Day Lodge, Murray River, James H. Brooks, G. C. Templar presided at the several sessions and the following G. L. officers were present: Oswald Graham, P. G. C. T., Margaret F. McConnell, G. Vice T., A. D. Fraser, G. Sec'y, and G. A. Watkins, G. Treas. The pro tempore appointments were Russell Finlay, G. Chap., Geo. Yoston, G. Marshal, Wm. G. Graham, G. Guard, Sister Kerwin, G. D. Mar. Sister Yoston, G. Organist. The following committees were appointed: State of the Order, O. Graham, Wm. Graham, Nathan Irving, Finlay; Wm. Graham, Russel Finlay, Lyman Giddings, Juvenile Work; Sisters McLeod, Hugh and Stewart. Several lodges were represented. About twenty candidates took the Grand Lodge Degree and at the afternoon session over fifty members were present.

ANNUAL CONVENTION CHURCH OF CHRIST

The opening meeting of the annual convention of the Churches of Christ of P. E. I., was held in the Central Street, Christian Church, Summerside, Thursday evening, July 5th. Mr. H. R. Bell, minister of the church, in chosen words welcomed the people to the town homes and church. Mr. Harding, minister of the Tignish Church, responded in his usual pleasing manner. Dr. Spafford, minister of Baptist Church, and Mr. Armstrong, minister of the Church of Christ at Montague, then led in prayer, after which a well prepared sermon was delivered by Mr. O. B. Emery, minister of the Charlottetown Church.

Thursday, 9.30 a. m. The devotional service was led by E. S. Norton, of Montague. During this service Bros. O. B. Emery and G. P. Assiter, led in prayer. Mr. W. H. Harding, president of the convention then took charge of the meeting, and a number of capable addresses were given by the different ministers.

The subject allotted to Bro. G. P. Assiter of Halifax, was "Making Use of the Public Press." He referred to the practices of business houses. How many of them attribute the success they have made to such practices. He also drew attention to the importance of prominence. He believed that the people needed no precedence and no "Thus saith the Lord" in following this example of the world. Then Brother E. C. Armstrong of Montague, took for his subject "Ought the Church Boost the Preacher?" Mr. Armstrong emphasized the fact that work cannot be successfully done without cooperation and sympathy. The subject of Personal Evangelism was ably presented by Bro. J. W. Hayter of New Glasgow. The late Dr. A. D. Pierson said that he never undertook to speak on any subject without that subject having first illumined his own life and having seen put into practice. He emphasized the importance of practical touch where pulpit oratory has failed. The closing address—Optimist or Pessimist, which was given by W. H. Harding, of Tignish. He referred to the present crisis and showed that out of the present chaos would emerge the church, purified and made more fit for the Master's work. Many the visiting brethren led in the discussion.
