King's Title

(Special to The Guardian.)

BELFAST, Dec. 11.—It is understood that the 1927 issue of treasury notes will bear the change in title of the King, who will be designated King of Great Britain and North Ireland.

P. J. Mulqueen, chairman of the Canadian Olympic Committee, gave a verbal report. In his remarks he outlined a trip made by himself and J. A. McVicar, president of the C. A. A. U., during which they visited branches as far west as Vancouver. He referred briefly to the splendid support accorded him by officials of the C. A. A. U. and its allied bodies in establishing the Olympic work on a firm basis. It is the proposition of the committee, he said, to have a smaller and selective team to represent Canada at the 1928 Olympic games at Amsterdam. This will decide the expenses and will allow the committee to defray the expenses of a larger number of athletes to the centre where the selective tests will be made. Montreal will probably be chosen for this purpose, he said.
