CHANGES IN RACING RULES PLANNED.

CHICAGO, Ill., Feb. 19.—The American Trotting Association, the controlling organization of the Western turf, began its biennial congress in Chicago today with all signs pointing to a session of more than ordinary interest and importance. The association will consider and act upon a number of changes produced by the rule committee, some of which are of a more or less radical character. A most radical change proposed is intended to absolutely divorce the judges' stand from the betting ring. If this rule should be adopted it would mean that the judges would take no notice whatever of the speculation end of the meeting, and that whenever officials declared off bets they would do so on their own account and not as an enforcement of a prescribed rule in turf statutes. The rule now in force against the use of hobbles probably will be repealed and similar action is expected to be taken in regards to the rule forbidding drivers to carry watches in their hands while participating in a race. TORONTO WORKING MEN WANT MORE WAGES.

TORONTO, Feb. 19.—Union labor on the whole will be very active this spring. No fewer than ten trades or crafts are looking for a more or less decided improvement in conditions, whereas one year ago there was practically no activity. May Day passing off without a strike.

Ten thousand men are affected by the demands for higher wages or improved conditions to be made this year and the movement seems to be spreading, no less than ten unions being involved, as follows: Carpenters, 1500 members. Metal workers, 300. Wiremen, 150. Lathers, 100. Painters, 600. Street railway employees, 1400. Tailors, 1000. Garment workers, 3000. Printers, 1200. Machinists, 900. Barbers want shorter day.
