REDISTRIBUTION DISCUSSED AT TIGNISH.

It is a healthful sign that our people are taking an interest in the question of redistribution as it will affect the Island. In this connection an obliging correspondent sends a condensed report of a public meeting held in Tignish Hall on Monday evening last, called jointly by Dr. Wickham, President of the Liberal Association and Dr. Murphy, President of the Liberal Conservative Association of West Prince for the discussion of this question. Charles Dalton was called to the chair and the meeting was addressed by E. Hackett, M. P., Capt. Read M. P., B. Gallant, M. P., P. J. H. Bell and Rev. A. E. Burke.

THE COMMITTEE OF PRIVILEGES.

The committee of privileges before which The Guardian was summoned to appear and answer for itself came to a sudden and rather inglorious end yesterday afternoon. The law officers of the Government reached the very proper conclusion that the committee (even had it been properly constituted which it was not) had no power to swear witnesses, or to punish for contempt or breach of privilege committed outside the House, or even to determine what constitutes a breach of privilege. The Guardian knew all this many years ago, and thought that the merest tyro in Parliamentary affairs knew the same. The law officers have now discovered these facts. It would have been a convenient and desirable thing had they made the discovery before appointing the committee and seeking to clothe it with powers which the House itself does not possess.

The fact that it was a joint meeting in which both political parties were strongly represented will give additional weight to the resolutions adopted and ought to strengthen the hands of those who are charged with protecting our rights at Ottawa. It seems now to be conceded that a case will be made out and referred to the Supreme Court in time for a decision to be handed down before the redistribution bill becomes law. Whatever that decision may be, we presume that Parliament will not legislate in opposition to it.

A LETTER FROM THE HON. MRS. LAMBART OF OTTAWA TO THE CH'VTOWN WOMEN'S COUNCIL.

It is thought that the following extract from an interesting letter from the Hon. Mrs. Lambart of Ottawa will interest and benefit the women of the agricultural districts of this Province:

"Mrs. Hoodless of Hamilton considered that what had been accomplished in the last year for farmers' wives would bring more happiness into the agricultural homes, more education, more profit, and better results in the improvement of their marketable produce and the increased revenue they would derive as a result of this improvement.

"The Farmers' Institutes for June had been the result of the lectures given by the officials of the Experimental Farm. But since then the women became ambitious and meetings of the Farmers' wives had resulted in small competitive exhibitions of poultry, butter, its quality and acceptable preparation for market, bread, pickles and other farm products of all kinds until to-day at this meeting the Farmers' Wives Institutes were applying for affiliation with the National Council of Women, which it was hardly necessary to say would be most gladly granted them. She (Mrs. Hoodless) also spoke of the blessing which the Agricultural College at Guelph had been to the men of the Dominion—that the education provided them was so liberal including the full classical and mathematical Arts course of our ordinary university, but applying this knowledge to Agricultural work, including the chemistry of soils, food, of plants, of crops and all such kindred applications of the science of chemistry.

"Such subjects as landscape gardening, the classics of agricultural record, such as the Georgics and Bucolics of Virgil, etc., and a diploma from Guelph Mrs. Hoodless considered so exceptionally valuable that she had chosen that college for the education of her own son, but her object in bringing up this point here was to say that Sir William Macdonald had just finished building and equipping a College of Domestic Science for Women in the grounds of the Guelph Agricultural College. That this new building was as perfect as any unlimited money expenditure could make it, and that even the residential quarters of the students were quite ideals of comfort and refinement. Mrs. Hoodless hoped that by this time next year this women's college of Domestic Science at Guelph would be in a position to ask for affiliation in the Council of Women. She considered the agitation set on foot on behalf of women's interests of all kinds in this organization had been the means of bringing about this most desirable result and feeling this provision for the education of women in all branches of domestic science, and of such branches of farming, horticulture, and agriculture as are suited to their sex. This new college for women has cost \$175,000 and anyone desiring further information about it can obtain all particulars by writing to the college for it. A number of most interesting bulletins have been published by the Ontario Government. They constitute leaflets on bread making, bee-keeping, poultry feeding and are also reports of the doings of the Farmer's Wives' Institutes. These may be had free of charge by addressing Mrs. Orwellman, Superintendent of Farmers' Institutes, Parliament Building, Toronto."
