Distribution Of Ration Books Speeded Up

Distribution of Ration Book No. 3 was in full swing yesterday and the tempo was greatly stepped up over the previous day. Partial figures from the five Local Ration Boards throughout the province revealed last night that during the first two days of the campaign a total of 38,000 books had been handed out by the volunteer workers at the various distribution centres.

Charlottetown's figure, was increased by 8,200 which is about four times greater than the record for the opening day. Answering Mayor Holman's appeal for a speed up in applications, citizens started streaming into Queen Square School early yesterday morning and the rush continued up until closing time last night. Long queues of people lined up outside the building during the day and the traffic into the school was regulated by a member of the City Police force who was stationed at the door.

Reminding citizens that today is the last chance to receive books in the city, Mayor Holman again asked them to report promptly for their books. It is expected that about 10,000 books will have to be distributed in Charlottetown today as the total for the last campaign reached 21,000. The total for the two days of this campaign now stands at 111,338.

The total for the Charlottetown Ration Board, which includes most of Queen's County, stood at 170 reports from the majority of the distributing centres directed to the Ration Board. The total for the province as a whole is 1,000,000. Charlottetown's share is 2,136.
