 NEW YORK, July 26—(A.P.)—With turnover well below that of the week's preceding three-hour markets, stocks resumed their advance today.

The rise was most pronounced in the industrial category which, including the enthusiastic metal and repeal issues, finished with gains of around 1 to 6 points. Rails were quieter and some utilities failed to get very far. Wheat had a good day, up some 5 to 6 cents, while cotton and bonds improved.

nose to tail a length of about 60 feet. Her twin Isotta Fraschini engines, each capable of developing 940 horsepower, propel the 12,270-pound craft at a maximum speed of 150 miles an hour, and a cruising speed of 130. The pontoons of the craft are so built that she will bear her weight in about a foot and a half of water.

Questioned as to the likelihood of General Balbo awaiting the craft at Shoal Harbor the commander replied with a shrug of his shoulders, "Not know; but hope."

Asked what route the armada would take from Newfoundland in their flight across the Atlantic he replied, "Head direct for Ireland."

Taking Chance
 To the question what would happen if a forced landing were necessary on the long hop across the Atlantic, he replied: "If calm we land and await, like we do here; but if rough gone; and I, lively illustration of a double somersault with his hand indicated plainly and significantly what the speaker meant by "gone!"

"Too much!" was Captain Rovis' comment on the welcome accorded them in the United States. It had, he implied, been a strenuous time, so enthusiastic was the reception everywhere accorded them.

Mr. King, produce markets." Mr. Sauve stated, forgot to admit that, after the war, European countries which had been ravaged by the fire of machine guns, needed reconstruction. Of this market Canada had received its share, but in 1929 and 1930 these countries had re-organized in such a manner as to produce for their own requirements, one of the reasons being the lowering of the franc. As the crisis became more acute, trade throughout the entire world dropped more than 60 percent. "Could Mr. King have prevented this, he who lost markets when he was in power and even before the beginning of the crisis?" Questioned the Postmaster General.

The Bennett Government, upon United States who had closed their markets to Canada under the King regime, Mr. Sauve proceeded: "If you do not wish us to sell our products to you, you will not flood our markets with yours." The Bennett Government, he stated, had not closed any market which imported Canadian products.

RUBBER STOCKS INCREASE
 Rubber stocks, though quiet, reflected the new increase in tire prices. The rise, 10 per cent, was the third advance since May 1 and resulted, manufacturers explained, from mounting costs of production, including the processing tax which became effective August 1, and the higher raw material prices.

Wall Street rumor has it that the treasury next month may try an issue of long term bonds, perhaps of eight to 10 years maturity, the Government's obligations falling due next month are fairly light, which leads some bankers to believe that such a flotation may be attempted for at least part of the funds desired, totaling about \$40,000,000 in maturing certificates as well as a few short-term bill issues.

LESS PRONOUNCED
 Meanwhile an trade gains are less pronounced in certain lines, while in others there are signs of the seasonal slackening so long overdue. Steel production this week, "iron age" estimates, is down to 87 per cent of capacity from 58, but the review sees compensation for this slight sag in the virility of scrap markets which, it believes, may be anticipating a fall rebound.

Electric power output last week made a smaller percentage gain over a year ago than in the previous week, but all in all any recessions that have appeared so far are much less than could be reasonably expected.
