**EGG LAYING CONTEST.**

Notes on the Prince Edward Island Egg Laying Contest for the 28th Week of the Contest Ending May 15, 1923.  
A decided increase was noted in the production this week over that of the previous week, 533 eggs being laid against 753 eggs last week. The total production to date for the entire contest is 14,945 eggs.  
Mr. James E. Daly's pen of Barred Rocks led the contest for the week with a production of 55 eggs; Mr. Everett Howatt's pen of White Leghorns No. 16, the Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 15 and Mr. J. J. McGillivray's pen of White Leghorns No. 29 all tied for 2nd place, with a production of 53 eggs each; Mr. H. L. Machon's pen of Barred Rocks is 3rd with 52 eggs; Colonel Cockcroft's pen of Barred Rocks took 4th place, with 48 eggs; Mr. Bert H. Brown's Barred Rocks were 5th, with 45 eggs; and Pendleton's Barred Rocks were 7th, with a production of 43 eggs for the week.  
Mrs. Edward Bullpitt's pen of White Leghorns leads the contest to date, with a total production of 975 eggs; the Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 18 is 2nd, with 949 eggs; Mr. August Wisner's White Leghorns are 3rd, with 925 eggs; and Mr. D. F. McDonald's Barred Rocks are 4th, with 915 eggs.  
At present the following hens are leading:  
Mr. D. F. McDonald's Barred Rock hen No. 7 is first, with 134 eggs; Mr. J. J. McGillivray's White Leghorn hen No. 6 is 2nd, with 128 eggs; D. F. McDonald's Barred Rock hen No. 9 is 3rd, with 126 eggs; being equalled by the Experimental Station's White Leghorn hen No. 1, which also laid 126 eggs.
