AFTERNOON SESSION.

After roll call a paper was read by Miss Durant on "Teaching Patriotism in Schools," and was well discussed by Messrs Kielly, Campbell, Anderson, Ross, Weeks, Smith and Mr Wagstaff of Halifax. A vote of thanks was then tendered to Miss Durant for the excellent paper.

Mr Charles Kielly then read a paper on "Examinations, are they beneficial as a test of scholarship." The subject was handled in Mr Kielly's usual masterly style, and elicited considerable approval. On motion it was decided to have the paper published. Rev Charles McKay gave a very interesting talk on "Education in relation to modern progress," which was listened to with much attention and a hearty vote of thanks was tendered the Reverend gentleman. After the different committees were appointed, meeting adjourned.

The public meeting of the Convention was a grand success. Dr Darrach occupied the chair, and extended a hearty welcome to the teacher on behalf of the citizens of Kensington. The program was one of the best ever given under the auspices of the teachers. The solos of Mamie Bentley, Miss Blanche Craig and Mr Alfred Glover were well rendered. The duet by Mr and Mrs G Tupin was given in their customary good style, and enthusiastically encored. Pleasing readings were given by Miss Ruby Darrach and Miss Ethel Connors. Very fine addresses were delivered by Rev Charles McKay and Rev F W Wightman. Prof J McLellan favored the audience with some excellent violin selections, accompanied on the organ by Miss Birdie Moynagh. Mr Robert Lamont, the popular singer, delighted his hearers with his rendering of favorite Scottish songs, and the closing one "Duncan Gray" brought down the house. Meeting closed with "God save the Queen" and three cheers and a "tiger" for Mr Lamont.

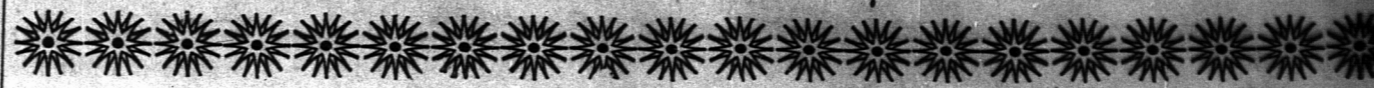
MORNING SESSION.

A paper on Composition and Spelling, was read by Mr Matthias Smith. A number of excellent suggestions were given on this very important subject and caused considerable discussion.

On motion of Mr Carruthers, the resolution passed by the Charlottetown Teachers' Institute regarding the action of the government in repealing the



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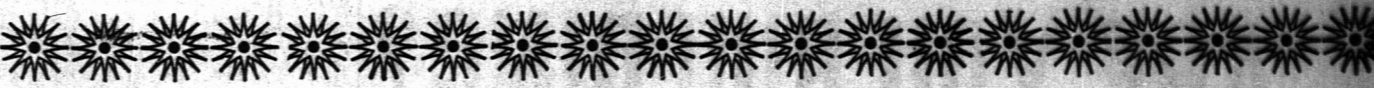
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supplementary clause was adopted unanimously.
