Foreign Language Broadcasts Planned

(C. F. by Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Nov. 8.—The near east, South Africa and South America will receive first attention in the foreign language radio programs planned by Great Britain to overcome propaganda broadcasts by other powers, it was learned tonight.

The British short-wave programs, which probably will be sent out from the station at Daventry, will use Arabic for the Near East, Afrikaans (a kind of Dutch) for South Africa, and Spanish for South America.

Postmaster-General G. L. Tryon announced in the House of Commons that the costs of the new service will be paid by the British Broadcasting Corporation.

Another Successful Islander

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 8 — U. S. Commissioner James C. Cullen said yesterday that evidence against 14 seamen of the freighter Algic "apparently" indicated breach of discipline rather than mutiny. Mr. Cullen, presiding at a preliminary hearing, ordered a defense counsel who said the testimony of the ship's chief officer gave "no evidence of mutiny." The sailors were charged with violation of mutiny laws when the Algic returned after a South American cruise.

Weston Healy, the chief officer, said the sailors turned off steam used for loading cargo while the ship was in Montevideo, Uruguay. He testified that the sailors objected to working with non-union stevedores.

Wilfred T. McQuaid, attorney employed by the National Maritime Union to defend the sailors, asked that Healy's testimony be stricken out. Mr. Cullen took the request under consideration as the hearing continued.

The Mr. McQuaid mentioned above is a Charlottetown boy and has been practicing law in Baltimore for five years, and has so far been successful in cases brought before the Superior Courts of the State of Maryland. His many friends here will wish him continued success.

Publisher Sees No European Conflict

NEW YORK, Nov. 8 — (CP) — Lord Beaverbrook, Canadian-born British publisher, arrived today to spend a few days in New York before flying to Jamaica, British West Indies, for the winter.

"There is not going to be any war in Europe among the first-rate powers," said the publisher who was born at Newcastle, N.E. "I come here once a year during a war crisis and always say the same thing."

POLICE REPORT

Seventy-three arrests were made in Charlottetown during October. Chief Birtwistle said in his report read by Dr. Heath McIntyre, chairman of the police committee.

Arrests had been made for the following offences:
 Attempted rape, 1; breaking and entering, 3; contributing to juvenile delinquency, 1; drunk and disorderly, 6; drunk and incapable, 42; insanity, 3; juvenile delinquency, 3; (breaking and entering); obtaining money by false pretences (worthless cheque), 1; theft, 3; uttering forged document, 1; vagrancy, 3.

In addition to the above mentioned arrests there were six prosecutions under the Prohibition Act for unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor, with five convictions and one dismissal; three convictions under the Excise Act; one for cruelty to an animal; one for disorderly conduct; one for keeping a vicious dog; seven for non-payment of dog tax; two under the sanitary by-law; three for the traffic by-law and three for "speeding."

On October 27th the Force collected thirty three samples of milk from licensed vendors, delivering same to City Analyst for test.

The amounts collected in fines and costs during October are as follows: prohibition fines, \$210.00; excise fine, \$25.00; miscellaneous fines and costs, \$230.75. Total amount collected, \$465.75.
