(Continued from Page 6) offered a 30-day optional bid of 95-1-2. There were placed with our bankers and were sold for par. One point being allowed. The bid was \$100,000. Since that time our 4% bonds have sold as high as \$103.75. Our 3 1/2% bonds sold at 101. If the citizens did not know our financial position, certainly the investment houses did, and now are bidding for our bonds. What better assurance of your City's financial standing can you have than that of the City of Ottawa, which has a larger population than any municipality in Canada, and those bids were from companies in the Maritimes, Quebec and Ontario.

Fixed Expenditures

"It does not matter what form of civic administration we have or by whom administered, we are earmarked for which there is no control. These are called fixed expenditures. Some of these are as follows:

Debt interest	Approx. \$100,000
Payment to Sinking Fund	50,000
Payment to Board of School Trustees	80,000
Street lights	12,000
Grants	12,000
Insurance	5,000
Wig-wags	500
Total	\$284,500

"No matter what else is paid, such as Administration, Police Department, Public Property (Garbage, etc.), over which there is some control as to the amounts spent, fixed expenditures must be paid or else the City would default.

"This of course is sufficiently guarded against for the most part by a very low valuation on property.

Valuation

"A word about valuation of Real Estate and Personal Property. Your present Council and your immediate past Council have seen the need for a revision in the method of valuation, and consequently have obtained from the Provincial Legislature authority to create a commission to deal with this matter. Considerable thought as to how should compose this board has been given, and it is hoped that a more equitable and true valuation of property there would, I feel, be a reduction in the rate of assessment. The year 1946 should see the appointment of this board, and an adjusted and corrected valuation in effect in 1947.

Finance Committee

"Since 1939 the Council has been fortunate in having an exceptional group of men on the Finance Committee. I believe that the practice of having the same men on the Finance Committee, and that they have proven to be of much benefit to this City. Once your Finance Committee thoroughly understands the system of civic financing they should not be shifted every two years. As a matter of fact, this is a poor practice as you can see that just at the time they would be familiar with the work, they would be replaced, and so on. It is my hope that any changes could be detrimental; a little new blood into any Council from time to time is desirable, but all the new Council members must learn from the older men at the Board.

"The City Clerk of the City of Charlottetown shall receive all rates, and assessments, and shall collect and impose upon, or payable by any of the inhabitants of the said City. The City Clerk shall be the General Accountant for the City, and shall receive and preserve in his office all City accounts and books, and all voucher documents, and papers relating to the accounts and contracts of the City, its revenues, debts and local affairs, and shall annually prepare a full and accurate report of the financial condition of the City, and whenever required, shall furnish the Mayor or any committee of the Council, with abstracts from any books, accounts, vouchers, or documents in his office, or any information in relation to anything pertaining to this office, or to the revenue of the City, and he shall, at all times, permit the Mayor or any member of the City Council to examine any books, papers or documents in his office, and the books containing the said accounts, with all vouchers and papers relating thereto, shall in the first week in every month, be submitted to the Auditors of the City, whose duty shall be to audit the same. Fertile Act

The Fertile Act of the Legislature in this respect, apart from the Cemetery Act and an Act passed in the present year and herein after referred to, are: 48 Victoria, Cap. 22, being regular monthly meetings held on the second Monday of each month, should be attended by you, for by so doing you will be able to know what business is being transacted, what problems are confronting your Council and how your money is being spent.

"By discussing civic problems with your Council members, you will not be entirely dependent on their own judgment but from the opinions expressed and discussed they will derive much help which will benefit them greatly in carrying out their best interests.

"In closing may I say, by cooperation between citizens, Council and the people, Charlottetown will continue to be the best place in the whole universe in which to live."

Attorney General's Position
