SIR GEORGE ROSS HAS PASSED AWAY

For many years Premier of Ontario and Since 1911 Liberal Leader in Senate

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, March 7.—Senator Sir George Ross, former Premier of Ontario, died at eight o'clock this morning. The late Sir George Ross was born in Middlesex County, Ontario, Sept. 14, 1841. He matriculated in law at Albert University in 1879 and graduated LL.B. in 1883.

MARCONI PREDICTS SUCCESS OF RADIO-TELEPHONY

ROME, March 7.—William Marconi last night delivered a lecture in the Ancient Circus of Augustus before King Emmanuel and Queen Helena, and the notabilities of Rome, and a great throng of the public generally. Mr. Marconi's theme was the progress of radio-telephony. He predicted the early success of radio-telephony, declaring that the human voice could be projected across the ocean by this method more quickly than a message could be sent by cable.

MEXICO CITY, March 7.—General Huerta, replying to a message from the United States, asking if he would accept the mediation of Brazil, Argentina and Chile to settle the problem, replied it would not be emphatic as relations with these countries are not cordial.

SUFFRAGETTES IN MORE TROUBLE

Had Battle with Police. Sylvia Pankhurst and Ten Others Arrested.

(Canadian Press) LONDON, March 8.—In a pouring rain on Trafalgar Square this afternoon, Militant Suffragettes engaged in a pitched battle with the police. Sylvia Pankhurst and seven other women and three men were arrested. The women's suffrage Association was holding a meeting. Sylvia Pankhurst arrived in a taxi cab. Detectives promptly surrounded the cab and hustled it in the direction of Holloway Prison.

P.E.I. FOXMEN IN LONDON, ENG.

(Canadian Press) LONDON, CANADA, March 8.—Dr. Gordon Alley and Thomas Morris, Charlottetown, who are here seeking to interest the market in the silver fox industry, placed some stock of Weeks Co. although it is not easy to persuade Londoners of the great profits in the industry.

TEMPERANCE SERVICE AT GRACE METHODIST

There was a large attendance at Grace Church last evening when, in lieu of the ordinary, a "Temperance Service" was held, presided over by His Honour Lieutenant Governor Rogers. The service having been opened with a musical programme, all and interesting addresses were delivered by the Governor, Col. F. S. Moore, Mr. George E. Full and the Rev. T. Marshall. His Honour spoke on the benefit to the community of the prohibition law. Some people, he said, objected to it, but if it was wrong to sell liquor it was wrong also to license the sale.

CANNIBALS EAT FRENCH SAILORS

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Mar. 7.—Three French sailors from the French ketch Guadeloupe were eaten by natives of Malekula, New Hebrides, recently, according to a story of the master of the vessel, received here today. The vessel was engaged in recruiting the master says, and had called at the island to obtain laborers. The cannibals attacked the three men as soon as they landed and ate them on the spot. When the captain went ashore to ascertain the cause of the delay, he was ambushed and captured. He escaped unharmed, however, but was unable to recover the bodies of his companions.

THE NEW LEADER OF THE SENATE

Likely to be Hon. Hewitt Bostock of British Columbia. Liberal Majority Rapidly Dwindling.

(From Our Own Reporter.) OTTAWA, March 8.—In all probability Hon. Hewitt Bostock of British Columbia will succeed Sir George Ross as Liberal Leader in the Senate. On the death of Sir Richard Cartwright, Senator Bostock was the choice of Sir Wilfrid Laurier but Sir George Ross won out when the Upper House was called upon to make a choice. Hon. Mr. Dandurand would probably be chosen now but for the fact that he is a French Canadian and two French Canadian leaders would be had politics.

LONDON, March 4.—"Where is Earl Grey?" is the question arising out of an advertisement appearing in the Sunday Times, in which a reward is offered to anyone supplying an address where a cable message will reach His Lordship. The advertiser, a man named Williams, is the secretary of the Exchange of International Colonial Commerce, which disputes Earl Grey's option on the Aldwych site, and which has already threatened to contest the matter in the courts if the Dominion building scheme is pushed. It is understood the Exchange is now desirous of locating Earl Grey in view of possible legal proceedings. The advertisement was offered to the London morning dailies, which refused to insert it.
