A schooner is reported ashore near White Sands. It is said that she sprang a leak owing to damage sustained from the ice, and that the Captain was forced to beach her.

The funeral of the late Judge Alley took place yesterday afternoon and was attended by a large number of citizens. The members of the law society preceded the cortege.

RAILWAY News of May 3rd says:—The Plant line steamships are taking the bulk of travel between Newfoundland and Cape Breton to Boston this spring. There is not one half the people going through by rail this season as last and it has been getting less for some time past.

The Morning Chronicle says: Capt. Pve did some quick work with the Halifax last week. He left here at 8 o'clock Thursday morning, arrived at Boston at 11 o'clock Friday morning, discharged and reloaded a large cargo and sailed again to return at 12 45 Saturday and arrived at 5 30 last evening. Not a bad record. The steamer brought besides a full cargo about 75 passengers.

EASTERN NOTES.—The Spring is cold and backward here, caused by the immense bodies of drift ice surrounding our shores, whose chilling and benumbing influences affect the climate, the growth of vegetation, and even the health of the inhabitants. The prevailing winds have been north east for the last three weeks, and as a consequence the Gulf ice appears to be jammed against our Island shores and to be full of floating ice clear to the coast of Cape Breton. From East Point no water can be seen north or east while south and west there appears to be considerable. The large ocean liners are passing freely in and out of the St. Lawrence, proving conclusively that we have the main body of ice down here. A few vessels are cruising back and forth in the open water on the south side vainly looking for an opening to get to the Magdalen Islands. There are plenty of herring on both sides of the Point, but no chance to set nets.—Some potatoes have been planted but the soil is not in good condition, owing to the want of rain and continuous cold.—A well attended, well conducted concert was held in the Kingsburgh Schoolhouse on the evening of the 2nd inst. William McLean was chairman and auctioneer. The proceeds, some \$30.00, go to beautify and improve the school grounds. The schoolhouse is among the finest of our country ones, and a well finished hall is up stairs, a benefit and a credit to the community.—The intelligence was flashed over the wires lately of the death of two eastern men in Boston, residents of Fairfield, and at one time neighbors, both killed by the electric cars, within a few days of each other. First, Peter McIsaac, leaving a wife and child in Boston, and Silas Holland, leaving a wife and two children on the Island, which he left only three weeks before his death.

Unwholesome Meat.

Yesterday forenoon the case of Geo. Lund and James Rankine, for selling a carcass of veal unfit for human food, was heard by His Honor the Stipendiary Magistrate. The meat was purchased by Marshal Cameron at the market on Friday. The summons was served the same day under the following article of the Criminal Code 1892:—
"Every one is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to one year's imprisonment who knowingly and willfully exposes for sale, or has in his possession with intent to sell for human food, articles which he knows to be unfit for human food."
Dr. Richard Johnson, health officer for the city, deposed that the animal must have been very young. It was so ill-fed and ill-nourished that it was unfit for food, and should not have been exposed for sale.
James McMillan, V. S., said he inspected the meat, which he would neither eat himself nor give to any person else to eat. It was soft, flabby and imma-ture. If the calf had any nourishment at all from its mother it must have been limited.
Murphy Blake swore that the carcass was unsaleable, and he did not consider it fit for food. From its appearance he would say it was killed after being dropped.
Francis Drake said he would neither eat nor sell the veal. It was unfit for food. He did not think the calf was many days old.
Henry Balls did not think the veal was fit for food. The calf might have been an hour old or it might be two days old.
Marshal Cameron testified to buying the veal on the Market Square. It was unfit for human food.
At the request of the prisoner the case was adjourned until this day week. Rankin, in reply to the court, said he bought the calf from a man named Brazil, who said it was nearly a fortnight old.
