PUBLIC SCHOOLS COURSE OF STUDY

(Continued From Page Five.)

MUSIC

In the music theory and practice should be combined. As a pupil begins to talk as a first step in learning a language so he begins to sing, a preliminary step in his course in music. Almost all pupils can sing when they enter school. Cultivate this gift. As soon as pitch and rhythm are fairly well established then the pupil may be introduced to the theoretical part of music. Not much can be done in our common schools in this subject but sufficient to enable the pupil in after life to enjoy and take some part in the service of song.

NATURE STUDY.

In a purely agricultural country, a course of study that fails to call the attention of the pupils to subjects bearing upon the cultivation of the soil would be incomplete. As a first step in that direction provision should be made for Nature Study. This subject is important, not merely because it brings the pupil closer to the farm than any other that is provided in the course, but also for its cultural value. Pestalozzi says "Observation is the basis of all knowledge." The habit of observation does not come from the study of textbooks. A habit of observation acquired in youth will be worth more to a man or woman than whole pages of carefully learned facts, or correctly performed examples. An eminent educationalist says: "In no way may the habit of observation be more successfully encouraged, or stimulated than by the study of Nature in some of her varied forms. The plant, the flower, the leaf, the seed, may help to bring into activity the observation of the child, while the birds, the insects and the rocks call for careful investigation and a skillful use of the eye." In this study the child is brought into direct, sympathetic, loving, contact with nature. If the eyes are once opened, materials for interesting and profitable study will never be lacking. Each recurring season will bring with it new friends and new pleasures.

SCHOOL GARDENS.

To make this teaching more effective there should be in connection with each rural school a School Garden. Any district of this province can easily provide the land necessary for a garden, and now that provision is made for instructing the teachers in this subject, there cannot be any cause for not making Nature Study and the School Garden a prominent feature of the schools.

In a circular issued by the Ontario Department of Education, urging the establishment of School Gardens, the aims of such are set forth as follows:

- To stimulate interest in rural life.
- To provide healthful exercise for body and mind, and to afford to the pupil an opportunity to direct his activities along useful lines.
- To develop at an early age habits of industry, respect for labor, and a love for productive and constructive work.
- To impart useful information in agricultural subjects.
- To give facility in the handling of tools and in the practice of garden craft.
- To promote the desire to improve home surroundings and to train boys and girls to do such work with efficiency.
- To promote the qualities that make for good citizenship, such as the responsibility of ownership, respect for public property, consideration for the rights of others and the principle of co-operation in seeking the common good.
- To encourage careful observation of Nature; thus enabling the pupil to understand his environment and to appreciate more fully the beautiful in nature.
- To promote a spirit of independent investigation in other branches of study.
- To bring the life and interests of the school more closely into touch with the home life of the pupils.

Wherever the school garden has been successfully introduced, and it is now a part of the school work in almost every county in the civilized world the aims set forth in the Ontario circular have been realized.

PHYSICAL CULTURE.

Provision should be made for physical culture in the course. "A sound mind in a sound body" is desirable. This can be done by the teacher attending to the position of the pupils on sitting, walking, etc. In addition to this occasional exercises to the accompaniment of music in the school room, would be beneficial and would also relieve the tedium of the class room.

ETHICAL TEACHING.

The subject of morals must find a place in the instruction given in any well conducted school. This is best taught by the teacher improving the opportunities that are presented in the incidents of the school day or are suggested by the other subjects of the course. No text-book in ethics, nor stated lessons on the subject, will be so effective as the incidental applications that are suggested by the other work of the school.

OTHER SUBJECTS.

In this course as outlined there has not been any provision made for teaching Latin, French, Geometry, Algebra. There is no time in the common school for teaching subjects. If they are taught, only a small minority of the pupils will study them. The majority will be neglected while the teacher's attention is given to the few.

CONCLUSION.

The aim of the course outlined above is to keep the pupil in sympathetic touch with the agricultural life of this province, and that he may become a well-informed, patriotic citizen. It aims to extend and intensify the English and Nature Study and to remove the unnecessary from the arithmetic, geography and history.


No course of study that could be prepared could be followed in its entirety nor should an attempt be made to do so. It is at best but a guide to give a general direction to the work. The teacher must adapt the course to his circumstances.

With the hope that something contained herein may aid in the further improvement of our excellent school system I submit this paper.


