Jane Azoff Is Winner Of Free-for-all

Sensational Finishes Are Again Witnessed As Racing Meet Nears Close

Upsets Continue With Only Two Favorites Coming Through Yesterday - Meet Winds Up Today With Great Card.

Pacing miles in 2:08 3/4, and 2:10 1/2 in the first two heats Jane Azoff, C. H. Horton's fast pacing mare yesterday captured the feature event of the Old Home Week racing program as she raced to victory over a fast field in the big Free-For-All Trot & Pace.

But while the Horton-owned mare was atoning for previous defeats this season the packed grandstands that overflowed into the paddock again saw upsets occur as Major Bowes walked off with the 2:22 Pace after an extra heat was necessary to decide the winner and Bebe McElwyn captured the 2:19 Trot & Pace from the favored Calumet Emerald by taking the first two heats of the race while dropping the third to Moon Glow in one of the many blanket finishes that the big crowd have been witnessing ever since the first heat was called on Tuesday afternoon.

and once again blanket finishes, thrilling stretch drives and fast times featured a meet that is getting more sensational every day. Favorites continue to fall by the wayside as the outsiders show surprising racing form and with the final day's racing coming up the Island racing fans hardly know what to expect, except that tomorrow they are certain the four day meet will wind up in an even more sensational manner than it started.

There were a few extra thrills thrown into yesterday's meet, as the fight for the second heat of the Free-For-All yesterday when at the top of the stretch she hit her left foreleg throwing the joint out of place. Alloway is favored to take the honors but the field is such that again anything can happen with Heatherbelle now in the veteran class liable to throw a stirring upset into the entire field. The 2:14 Trot & Pace is also scheduled with Aaron L. San Tom, Dudey Patch and Vester Bane, a field of fast pacing horses but the duel expected to be between San Tom and Aaron L. Windings up the program will be a dash race with seven entries, all evenly matched.

McDiarmid Meets Bault In Final

HALIFAX, Aug. 15.—(CP)—Don McDiarmid of Ottawa, Canadian Champion, and Don Bault of Halifax, Nova Scotia's no. 1 ranking player, swept into the final round of the Eastern Canadian Tennis Championships here today.

The rangy Ottawa star hit accurately and hard to the corners in his semi-final match against Hughie Little of Halifax, winning 6-2, 6-3, 6-4. On the backhand exchange, Little was able to hold his own, but when the play switched to the forehand side of the court, McDiarmid carried too much power.

Bault, who now meets McDiarmid in the finals Saturday, eliminated his younger brother, Gordon Bault of Halifax, 8-6, 4-6, 6-2, 6-4. The first set was a ding-dong affair from the baseline, with many breaks in service. The score ran up to 6-6 before the older brother held his own service and broke his brother's for the set.

The Canadian champion opened by an early lead in the first set and ran out by holding his service after breaking Little's twice. He was content with one break in service in the second but at the start of the third set found himself down 3-0 in short order. Rallying strongly, McDiarmid advanced to the net, forcing Little into numerous errors and scoring points on his overhead smash.

In the second set, both players started to hit harder and errors became more numerous. This was the one set Gordon won, moving into the net on deep shots to the backhand corner for points.

The top-ranking Nova Scotia player made out the best of the set, finding the range with his powerful forehand and adding point-on well-directed drop-shots off his backhand. Scores were 8-6, 4-6, 6-2, 6-4.

McCREADY LOSES EMPIRE LAURELS AUCKLAND, N. Z.—(CP)—Earl McCready, Canadian wresler who claimed the British Empire heavyweight wrestling title after defeating Jack Taylor in Canada in 1933, has at last lost his crown to John Katan after extending it successfully for seven years.

In the meantime the Amateur, Saskatchewan, held by Canada, Australia, New Zealand, England and South Africa and has been defeated in a title bout.

McCready was defeated in a match at Wellington, N.Z., by Katan who gained the only fall in a hard-fought contest. The new champion is a fellow-countryman, so that the title remains in Canadian hands.

McCready had four times challenged for the title in Canada and New Zealand, but had never before beaten McCready although he had a draw to his credit. He is a skilled but not spectacular wrestler. He has successfully defended his title against several challengers already.

Indians Pound Thornton Lee For 5-4 Win

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—(AP)—The American League-leading Indians pounded Southpaw Thornton Lee for 15 hits, including five doubles, in Cleveland today but failed to connect in the pincers and barely noded out Chicago 5-4. It was the fourth straight decision for the Indians and enabled them to hold their margin of two games over Detroit.

The Tigers, with Loue (Buck) Newsom contributing six-hit pitching and a double in the sixth inning that put his teammates in the lead, beat St. Louis Browns 5-2 at Detroit.

Joe Heving, a relief pitcher making his first start of the year, was a real relief to the aching Boston Red Sox. Handcuffing the world champion New York Yankees with three hits, he broke a four-game Sox losing streak and a six-game Yankee winning streak 11-1 at New York.

In Philadelphia, the last-place Athletics won the second game of a doubleheader from Washington Senators 6-5, dropping the opener 9-4.

Cincinnati Stumbles 1-0

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—(AP)—The stumbling Cincinnati Reds fell before the puzzling slants of Claude Passeau today, losing a 1-0 decision to the Cubs at Chicago. Passeau allowed only five hits in winning his 13th game of the season. The defeat left Cincinnati still five games ahead of Brooklyn, which also lost, as did the third-place Giants.

At Brooklyn, the Dodgers lost a ball game—but more important they lost Pee Wee Reese, their \$75,000 rookie shortstop, who was injured in the game.

Playing raggedly, the second place Brooks bowed to the Phillies 4-2. Reese fractured the heel bone in his left foot, sliding into second base in the seventh inning. He probably will be lost to the team for the rest of the season.

In Boston, the Bees continued their winning streak by combing their way to a 3-0 victory over the offerings of three Giant pitchers for 18 hits and a 12-1 victory.

Feller Will Pitch As Often As Needed

CLEVELAND, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Bob Feller will pitch "just as often as we need him" in Cleveland in 1940, according to the American League pennant, Manager Olin V. Vitt said today.

"He will start every four days, but we may use him often in relief roles," Vitt declared.

Sam Snead Makes Good As Married Golfer

By ROBERT CLARKE Canadian Press Staff Writer SCARBORO GOLF CLUB TORONTO, Aug. 15.—(CP)—A hard-hitting young man with a southern drawl and a new wife—Slim Sam Snead, made good as a married man today by shooting a brilliant 67 on the first round of the Canadian open golf championship, an event he won in 1938 and did not contest last year at Saint John, N.B.

Snead's four-under-par stroke gave the West Virginia professional, now attached to a club at Shawneetown-Delaware, Pa., a slender lead in the 72-hole grand tomorrow. The final 36 holes will be played Saturday.

Stanley Horne, of Montreal, stayed on Snead's heels with a 68, and Bobby Alston, of Ottawa, Harold McSpaden of Winchester, Mass., and Ray Mangrum, of Oakmont, Pa., were in the running with 68's. One stroke under par with 75 were little Paul Runyan, of White Plains, N.Y., Dick Meitz, of Chicago, and Vic Ghezzi, of Deal, N.J. Six were tied at 71, headed by Ralph Guidici, former United States open champion, Ky. Lefford, of Chicago, and Bill Kerr, of Toronto, runner-up yesterday for the Canadian professional golfers' association title.
