Ebb Of Taxes Has Been Reached

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21—President Coolsidge informed the United States Congress in his annual budget message today that the minimum cost of running the government had been about reached and that the normal expansion of a growing nation would henceforth involve added expenditure. The outlay of running the federal Government for the coming fiscal year was estimated by the president at \$3,336,207,921, an increase of \$160,083,326 over the outlay for the current year.

The estimates reflected the continuing efforts at economy. Mr. Coolsidge said, adding that, on the basis of calculations a surplus of \$330,307,000 was indicated for the fiscal year 1927. He expected a surplus of \$222,041,756 for the year ending next June 30 although a year ago it was established that the surplus this year would exceed \$373,000,000.

The bulk of the increase in this year's budget, it was said, would go to the postal service, which is operating under a new schedule of wages and rates, and the veterans' bureau, to meet increasing requirements of the soldier bonus.

Maintenance of the army and navy at their present enlarged strength is contemplated under the estimates, but the aviation services are allotted somewhat larger funds for purchases of equipment.

In suggesting the necessity for keeping the airplane industry alive as well as replenishing and refitting government air service equipment, the chief executive thought the total estimates of \$42,447,000 for the combined air services should accomplish the ends sought.

The President also made formal recommendation for the proposed reduction of the taxes and declared that every available Government resource would be employed in enforcement of the prohibition law.

He said he would send to Congress later a request for funds to expand the coast guard a part of his "dry" programme.

There seems to be a settled feeling on the part of persons who are in close touch with the situation that the plan of Speaker Lee Satterwhite, of the House, to call a special session will fall to the ground because of the obstacle of financing the expenses of such a session.

It is admitted that there is a bare possibility that Satterwhite and the representatives who are associated with him in the special session movement may yet find a way to bring about the desired object. The possibility of as many as one hundred members of the House agreeing to come to Austin and stay through a session at their own expense, and to put up the money for bringing witnesses here to testify in any investigation that might be held is looked upon as unlikely. Satterwhite's statement to the effect that the session would be worth while to the State of Texas from the standpoint of investigation of state departments even without any prospects of impeachment charges being filed, did not seem to arouse much interest around the capital, opponents of the special session intimating it would be devoted to playing politics and nothing of real good to the people of the state would be accomplished.

AMERICA BARS PRINCESS SAYS SHE'S SOVIET AGENT.

PARIS, Dec. 23.—Princess Nina Zizianoff, widow of a Russian officer, has definitely been refused a visa to settle in America following consultation of the local American authorities with the Washington state department. Consul Bigelow claims the princess is an agent of the Soviet government.

"The princess," he said, "was arrested during the war as an agent of the central powers and deported to Siberia. She is now an agent of the Soviet government and has been conducting sham anti-bolshevik propaganda in the United States with a view to establishing relations with societies and individuals."

Proposal To Link Stars Many Times

Up Montreal And Bigger Than Sun U. S. Cities By Air

TORONTO, Dec. 21—Stars which are twenty-seven million times the size of the sun, and which have a characteristic of variables—were discussed in an interesting and very lucid lecture by Dr. F. Henroteau, assistant chief astronomer at the Dominion Observatory, Ottawa, at the Macdonald Physics Building, McGill University, last night.

The lecture was held under the auspices of the Montreal centre of the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada and was open to the public, a point stressed by Dr. A. S. Ewe who expressed regret at the public's failure to attend the astronomical lectures in large numbers.

Dr. Henroteau prefaced his address with a little talk on the Milky Way, where the cepheids dwell. He said that until Galileo came and provided the astronomers with the telescope, the Milky Way was regarded as a meteor. Now, it is known to be an agglomeration of millions of stars, some as large as the sun and some millions of times larger.

Of these giant stars, the speaker continued, there may be many thousands to only one cepheid. This particular characteristic of this type is its variability in brightness, being at times twice as bright as at others. A strange thing about the variability is that its regularity is like clockwork goes on for days and months and centuries. But the explanation of the variability is not yet known.

There are known already 150 of these cepheids and the average distance of them is 10,000 light years, and light travels at 186,000 miles a second.

The lecturer said that at the International Astronomical convention at Cambridge last year, it was decided by astronomers from all parts of the world to make a special study of the cepheid type of 17. Delegates representing the United States, the Latin-American countries, and Canada would be in attendance for the consideration of problems of finance as relating to the placing of Latin-American securities, the establishment of direct trade routes between the commercial capitals of France, Russia, India, Rumania, North and South America, and Japan and America were chosen, the promotion of commerce between countries of the two continents.

Unfortunately, owing to the near approach of the Christmas holidays, the council found it impossible to secure the attendance of any of its members at this important conference.

A. O. Dawson, president of the Board of Trade, submitted a report regarding the presentation at Ottawa of resolutions adopted at the recent conference of Canadian Boards of Trade in Winnipeg. He expressed his gratification with the delegation, and the keen interest taken both by the Government and the Opposition in the findings of the conference.

Colonel W. E. Lyman president occupied the chair and a vote of thanks to the lecturer was voiced by Rev. W. T. Crombie.

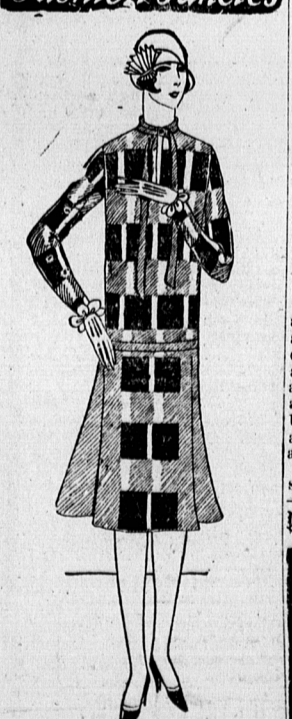
