SINGING AS A CHOIR

LONDON, Nov. 29.—An interesting experiment in repairing the physical and mental ravages of war is that carried out by the Vocal Therapy Society in the training of what are known as the King's Services Chords. The aim is to relieve men suffering from a stammer or other speech or voice affection, such as aphasia or aphonia, due to the war. Anyone brought into close contact with these cases knows of the utter misery caused by stammering or defective speech. The treatment which the Vocal Therapy Society has established in several of the Ministry of Pensions hospitals has succeeded in restoring to many patients their singing and speaking voice, and they have been organized in choirs, which during the last three years have given united concerts, which have exhibited a most remarkable improvement in tone, breathing, and general knowledge. One hospital choir, the winner of the silver cup presented by Sir Frederick Motley, raised in the course of last year 100 pounds, most of which was bestowed on benevolent objects.

Charlie Chaplin Engaged To Marry?

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 29.—Charlie Chaplin, motion picture comedian, and Pola Negri, Polish screen tragedienne are engaged to marry, according to reports current in motion picture circles here.

Chaplin refused either to deny or confirm the reported engagement.

The Los Angeles Times today in publishing the rumor quotes Chaplin as stating: "I cannot say yes. Any such announcement must of necessity come from her. Neither can I say no. Think of the position that would place her in."

The Chaplin-Negri romance, the paper continues, has its beginning when Chaplin toured Europe last year.

And when Negri recently arrived here and again met Chaplin she was said to have exclaimed: "This is what I have looked forward to ever since I started."

They are said to have been "almost inseparable" since she reached Los Angeles.

The comedian is said to have moved recently from a small cottage into a house of army rooms and to be occupying it alone.

There have been many reports in the last year that he was to re-marry.

He formerly was the husband of Mildred Harris, screen and vaudeville actress.

Ku Klux Klan To Organize In Dominion?

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—The first step toward international organization of the Ku Klux Klan, which was made in Canada it was announced here yesterday by the Rev. Oscar Haywood, national lecturer of the Klan. In making this announcement he said that he had received more than 500 applications for membership in the Klan from residents of Canada and the British Isles during a four weeks' lecture tour of the State of Pennsylvania. He said the campaign in Canada would be begun as soon as officers could find time to do it.

Today the officials of the Klan announced new plans for a drive for members in New York City in bold defiance of police orders, and opposition from the press and public. It is planned to turn the city into a stronghold of the Ku Klux Klan. Among the officials of the association expected to arrive for the campaign are Major E.D. Smith, Buffalo, King, and Rev. S.H. Campbell, Klobard and lecturer, former pastor of the First Baptist Church, of Tyler, Texas.

Dr. Haywood in announcing that the Klan planned a world-wide extension of their invisible empire said that it stood for the solidarity of the Protestant Gentile white race, not only in the United States, but throughout the world. "Previous to this he had stated that it was not a political organization but a racial movement not meant to oppress or abuse or ridicule other races.

Societies opposed to the Klan continue to denounce it at meetings and through statements.
