Opened in Montreal

# MARITIME PROVINCES

Are Well Represented—Addresses of Welcome Delivered.

MONTREAL, October 6.—The first Dominion convention of the Society of Christian Endeavor opened last night in St. James Methodist church. Delegates are still coming in, but enough have already arrived to make the convention a big success. The maritime provinces are all well represented.

The chair was occupied by G. Tower Ferguson, Toronto; chairman of the Canadian Council. After services, conducted by J. R. Thibault, and devotional exercise led by Rev. T. G. Williams, an address of welcome to the delegates was delivered by James Wilson, and Rev. W. Spaulding. Suitable replies were made by Rev. S. P. Rose, of Ottawa, vice-chairman of the Canadian Council; C. J. Atkinson, for Manitoba and the Northwest; W. L. Shurtleff, Coaticook, president of the Quebec Union, and Rev. Elliot, S. Roe, president of the Ontario Union.

The convention will settle down to business to-day.

MR. EDITOR.—At a recent meeting of the Medical Council, the subject matter of the subjoined resolution engaged its attention. The Council is desirous of publicly expressing its strongest condemnation of the practice referred to, and has authorized me to respectfully request that you will give early publicity to the following Minute of the Council.

Whereas the practice of publishing in the press, (whether with or without the connivance of the medical man) of so-called great cures and brilliant operations, has become very common, which practice besides being very disgraceful in itself, is dishonoring to the profession, and by its deceptive character is injurious to the public interests;—Therefore resolved that the Medical Council, on behalf of the Medical Society, hereby expresses its strong disapproval of the practice, and henceforth will not consider the physician blameless, unless he can clearly demonstrate his non-complicity in such advertisements; also with a view to the interests of the public, which may be deceived and misled by exaggerated and ignorant statements; also with a view to the protection of honorable medical men, who may be wrongly accused of complicity;—It is also resolved that the press shall be respectfully asked to refuse insertion in their columns of detailed descriptions of and comments upon, medical and surgical practice, unless such shall be signed by the medical men themselves.

(Note) It is thought that the assumption of the authorship by the medical man himself, places the responsibility on the proper shoulders, and leaves him to be dealt with in the usual manner.
