FAREWELL TO SUPERVISOR OF WOMEN'S CONVENTIONS

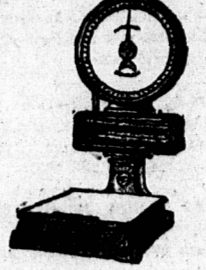
