At 12.30 the delegates lined up before the Provincial Building where a group photograph was taken by Mr. Bayer. At 1 p.m. they were driven to the County Club where the Rotarians entertained them to luncheon.

At one p.m. the delegates were conveyed by cars to the Country Club where they were the guests of the Rotarians to luncheon. President J. A. Clark occupied the chair. The visitors were asked to stand during the course of the luncheon when they received a true welcome to which Mr. J. LeRoy Holman, the newly elected President of the Maritime Board of Trade fittingly replied.

Mr. Logan's subject was "The Case of the Maritimes." He argued that the Intercolonial Railway cannot legally be treated as other railways of Canada and he reviewed at length the history of the Intercolonial, showing that it had been built for a specific purpose, namely to transport men and munitions during the winter and to Ontario and Quebec winter ports and to secure the consent of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick to enter confederation.

Proceeding again on their way they passed along the Mount Edward, Royalty and Malpeque Roads to the waterworks thence along the Lower Malpeque Road to the Beech Grove Inn where an excellent banquet awaited them and to which they did full justice. Some 150 guests sat down to dinner when the tables were cleared, the toast master, Mr. A. A. Pomeroy, proposed the following toasts:

The King: The Maritime Provinces responded to by Messrs H. J. Logan, J. LeRoy Holman, Capt. Masters and Mr. Burdett, President of St. John Board of Trade. "Our Guests" responded to by Mr. Logan.

"RESOLVED, that as essential to the proper progress and development of the agricultural, lumbering, fishing and manufacturing interests in the Maritime Provinces the Intercolonial Railway and Prince Edward Island Railway be divorced from the Canadian North ern system and be operated as a separate railway under the Department of Railways."
