## Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

## HOW RIFLEMAN BROWN CAME TO VALHALLA

(By Gilbert Frankan.)  
Considering now terribly the Canadians suffered in the first great gas attack the following poem which appeared in "Land and Water" recently, entitled "How Rifleman Brown Came to Valhalla" should appeal to all Canadians. At the front the poem is appreciated to the full—a test that is true to life. Frankan dates it from the front, and is evidently a soldier as well as a poet.

Flanders, June, 1916.  
To the Lower Hall of Valhalla, to the heroes of no renown—  
Relieved from his spell at the listening-post, came Rifleman Joseph Brown.  
With never a rent in his khaki, nor a smear of blood on his face,  
He flung his pack from his shoulder, and made for an empty place.

The Killer-men from Valhalla looked up from the banquet board  
At the unfurled breach of his rifle, at the unfurled point of his sword;  
And the unsung dead of the trenches, the kings who have never a crown,  
Demanded his pass to Valhalla from Rifleman Joseph Brown.

"Who came unlit to the party?" A one-legged corporal spoke,  
And the gashed heads nodded approval through the rings of the endless smoke.  
"Who comes for the beer and the Woodbines of the neverclosed canteen,  
With the barrack-shine on his bayonet and a full-charged magazine?"

Then Rifleman Brown looked round him at the nameless men of the line—  
At the wounds of the shell and the bullet, at the burns of the bomb and the mine;  
At the tunics' virgin of medals, but crimson-clotted with blood;  
At the ankle-boots and puttees, caked stiff with the Flanders mud;

### BELGIUM BEARING HER SHARE IN IT.

Government is giving fifteen million dollars annually to feed the hungry people.

Belgium is a sister nation in distress and Canada, with the others, should help relieve this distress. Seven million of these people are suffering the pangs of hunger—their little ones are dying from starvation—and we must help. The Belgian Relief Committee, with its headquarters at 59 St. Peters Street, Montreal, have been organized to assist in this work and to receive your donation. Have you sent it yet?
