Women's Missionary Society Meets

On Tuesday, August 15, the local union of the Murray Harbor North and Murray Harbor South Women's Missionary Society was held at Little Sands, the president, Mrs. J. S. McKay, presiding. All five of the auxiliaries were represented, besides Young Ladies' Branches and Mission Bands. Very interesting readings were given by the following ladies: Miss Smith, Mrs. Bell, Mrs. Horton, Mrs. Ferguson, trio by Little Sands Mission Band, solo by Mrs. W. McLeod. Rev. J. S. McKay and Rev. M. W. McDonald gave short addresses. The following paper, given by Mrs. L. Cowan, Lower Montague on "Giving," was asked to be printed, hoping it would help others to give to the great and noble work being done by our Women's Missionary Society.

"Giving."

I wonder if we women ever stop to think what it really means to be a member of a Missionary Society. Does it not mean that we have declared ourselves ready to work for our Heavenly Father in giving of our time, means and substance? We know that "all we are and all we have comes direct from God Himself," given to us in fulfillment of His divine plan to be used by us in His work. We are doing such work as He puts in our hands to do. In other words, we are God's stewards, stewards of the mental, physical and spiritual endowments which He has given us; also of the material things. He has not given us all these things to use for ourselves alone, but others. We must help our brothers in foreign lands and those in our lands who have not heard of Jesus who died for them. Suppose we were given a great piece of work to do for someone who we knew trusted us; would we not put forth every effort to do our very best for that person who had such confidence in us? Well, does not God trust us to do His work? And are we doing our best for Him? Do we realize that Canada is responsible for 15,000,000 people, and we have 350 missionaries working for those people. If the Island was treated in like proportion, we would only have one doctor, one minister or perhaps a minister and his wife. We could not have more than two. Think of it! God's work must be done, and it cannot be done without support. Men and women must be trained and educated for the work. Hospitals must be built for those who suffer, and schools for those who wish to learn. We all can help in this great work. Oh, how we should all thank God for the privilege of being able to help. We cannot all be missionaries in foreign fields, or in our home mission fields, but we all have the opportunity to give 2 or 3 hours of our time each month for missionary work and our missionary offering. The one who cannot attend the meetings, may still give their 5c or 10c a month and have the comfort of knowing that we are helping some poor mother or child in need. Let us stop and think what God gave for us. He gave His only begotten son, and think what Jesus gave for us. He gave his life on the cross that we might have eternal life, and He commanded us to teach all nations. We can all give something to help along the great work, and we can all pray for the work. It is our duty as missionary women, and the duty of the men as husbands to give all we can for those poor people who do not know Him. God is depending on us. Let us not fail Him. Let us be willing to give of our time to help train the children in missionary work. We look to them for our future workers. Let us do our utmost to fit them for the work. Years ago, a number of missionaries were killed in China; a private soldier stood and watched them die, the influence of their willingness to suffer and die for Christ was so great that that man today is a Christian General, and has a large army of Christian soldiers. Can we say, after hearing this story, that the work does not pay? Whatever we give let us give cheerfully. "Every man according as he prays and sets in his heart, so let him give not grudgingly or of necessity, for God loveth a cheerful giver." "The liberal soul shall be made fat, and he that watereth shall be watered also himself." "Upon the first day of the week let everyone of you lay by him in store according as God hath prospered him, that there be no gatherings when I come." We as givers will have a part with God in the plans for redeeming the world, and we will bring help and blessings into the lives of others.

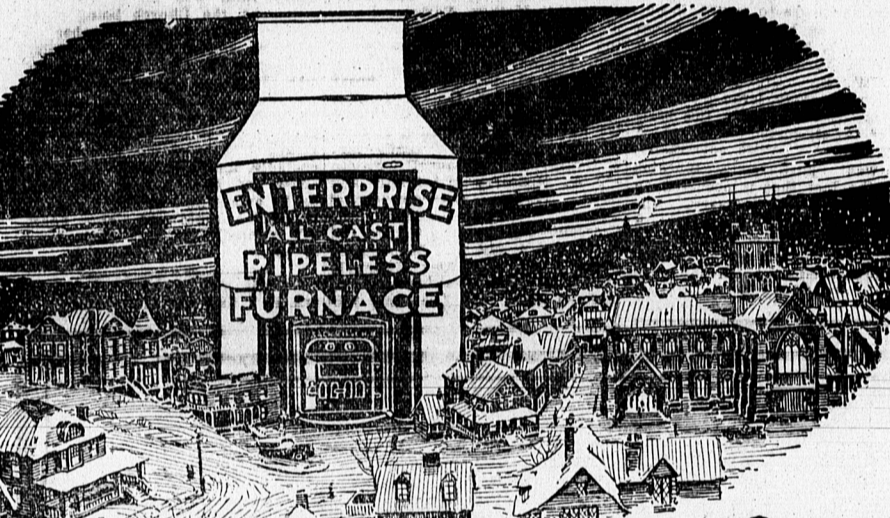

To Holders of Five Year 5½ per cent Canada's Victory Bonds

Issued in 1917 and Maturing 1st December, 1922.

CONVERSION PROPOSALS

THE MINISTER OF FINANCE offers to holders of these bonds who desire to continue their investment in Dominion of Canada securities the privilege of exchanging the maturing bonds for new bonds bearing 5½ per cent interest, payable half yearly, of either of the following classes:—

- (a) Five year bonds, dated 1st November, 1922, to mature 1st November, 1927.
- (b) Ten year bonds, dated 1st November, 1922, to mature 1st November, 1932.

While the maturing bonds will carry interest to 1st December, 1922, the new bonds will commence to earn interest from 1st November, 1922, GIVING A BONUS OF A FULL MONTH'S INTEREST TO THOSE AVAILING THEMSELVES OF THE CONVERSION PRIVILEGE.

This offer is made to holders of the maturing bonds and is not open to other investors. The bonds to be issued under this proposal will be substantially of the same character as those which are maturing, except that the exemption from taxation does not apply to the new issue.

Holders of the maturing bonds who wish to avail themselves of this conversion privilege should take their bonds AS EARLY AS POSSIBLE, BUT NOT LATER THAN SEPTEMBER 30th, to a Branch of any Chartered Bank in Canada and receive in exchange an official receipt for the bonds surrendered, containing an undertaking to deliver the corresponding bonds of the new issue.

Holders of maturing fully registered bonds, interest payable by cheque from Ottawa, will receive their December 1 interest cheque as usual. Holders of coupon bonds will detach and retain the last unexpired coupon before surrendering the bond itself for conversion purposes.

The surrendered bonds will be forwarded by banks to the Minister of Finance at Ottawa, where they will be exchanged for bonds of the new issue, in fully registered, or coupon registered or coupon bearer form carrying interest payable 1st May and 1st November of each year of the duration of the loan, the first interest payment accruing and payable 1st May, 1923. Bonds of the new issue will be sent to the banks for delivery immediately after the receipt of the surrendered bonds.

The bonds of the maturing issue which are not converted under this proposal will be paid off in cash on the 1st December, 1922.
