Introduce War Appropriation Bill In House

OTTAWA, June 5—(CP)—The House of Commons late today gave approval to a resolution covering introduction of a bill to provide a war appropriation and gave the bill first reading. The resolution was introduced by Finance Minister Islay on March 17 and debate in committee of the whole started on March 26. The measure has been before the House on almost every day of sitting since that time. Conservative House Leader Hanson moved that the committee report the resolution with the proviso that further questions might be asked when the bill was under consideration as to any points members wished explained concerning war appropriations. The bill provides for payment out of the consolidated revenue fund of a sum not exceeding \$2,000,000,000 in addition to the ordinary grants of Parliament to cover amounts required during the fiscal year ending March 31, 1943 for "the security, defence, peace, order and welfare of Canada." It also gives authority for the borrowing of the sum of \$2,000,000,000.

REPORT ON Provincial Debt And Expenditure OTTAWA, June 5—(CP)—Increase in current revenue and expenditure of provinces and a reduction in outstanding debt is reported in the statistical summary of the Bank of Canada for April and May, made public today. Total outstanding debt of the provincial governments was estimated for 1941 at \$2,130,400,000—the figure including total direct and indirect debt less sinking funds. This compares with \$1,179,800,000 in 1940. Direct debt, less sinking funds, was estimated at \$1,922,700,000 for 1941 and was \$1,957,300,000 in 1940. Total indirect debt, also less sinking fund, was placed at \$206,700,000 for 1941 compared with \$222,500,000 the previous year. Provincial distribution of the outstanding debt estimated for 1941 was shown as follows: Prince Edward Island, \$9,700,000; Nova Scotia, \$102,000,000; New Brunswick, \$99,800,000; Quebec, \$412,200,000; Ontario, \$848,000,000; Manitoba, \$116,200,000; Saskatchewan, \$232,600,000; Alberta, \$158,900,000; British Columbia, \$158,900,000.

Salvage for Canada's war effort—tons of it—have been collected by the Charlottetown Salvage Committee since it was organized this spring. Death Rate Laid to Poor Nutrition

Toronto, June 5—(CP)—Poor nutrition was responsible for the peak of Canada's infant and maternal mortality rate in 1938, Dr. Ernest Couture, director of the Pensions and National Health Department's maternal and infant hygiene division, told the Canadian Public Health and Ontario Health Officers' Associations meeting here. Only 25 per cent. of Canadian mothers have prenatal care, he said, and to this he attributed the fact that infant and maternal mortality rates are higher in Canada than in the United States, Britain or Norway.

Dr. Helen MacMurphy urged more attention to methods of preventing deaths from premature births which, she said, accounted for 25 per cent. of the infant mortality rate. Dr. J. A. Leroux of Vancouver urged the establishment of a federal division of venereal disease control and a campaign to suppress prostitution as means of checking the spread of the venereal diseases. The problem should be approached from a hygiene rather than from a moral standpoint.

Dr. James J. McCann, Liberal member of the House of Commons for Renfrew South and president of the Canadian Public Health Association, said the fact that 44 per cent. of the young men recently called up for military service were found physically unfit is "a crushing indictment of governmental laissez-faire and unconcern for the health of its people." "Governments should be brought to the sharp realization that what counts in the world is people and that wealth and material things are secondary," he said. "Today the need for conservation of health and physical fitness is greater than at any time in the nation's history. I suggest that the maintenance of our community health services will go a long way toward carrying the health of its people."

Dr. McCann advocated extension of community health services to all industrial plants throughout the country.

Corpus Christi Celebration in City Tomorrow

The Feast of the Corpus Christi will be observed in Charlottetown tomorrow by the Roman Catholic Churches with the traditional procession of the Blessed Sacrament. Thousands of worshippers will proceed through the streets of the city and attend open air Benediction at Notre Dame Convent. Commencing with Solemn High Mass at ten o'clock, the observance will be followed by the procession which will form up outside the Basilica where the congregation from the Church of the Most Holy Redeemer will join the members of St. Dunstan's Basilica. The whole procession will then proceed by way of Great George Street to Richmond to Westmount, to Sydney to Notre Dame Academy where an open air Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament will be given.

Invited To Hear Famous Speaker

SAINT JOHN, June 5—Mayor Wason and other members of the city council and Common Council Hopkins have received invitations from Mr. D. Gordon Willett, honorary secretary of the Canadian Club of Saint John to attend a public meeting to be addressed by Norman Birkett, the famous British jurist and broadcaster who will speak Tuesday evening, June 9, on "Britain's Message to Canada" in the Saint John High School auditorium.

Booklet Gives Short History of Nicholson Clan

"A Short History of the Nicholson Clan" is the title of an interesting booklet, a copy of which was received recently by Mr. C. W. Nicholson, who left the book to his cousin, Mr. Ernest N. Simmons, in Los Angeles, both of them being members of the Nicholson clan on the maternal side. The author of the booklet is Donald A. Nicholson, of Lynn, Mass., formerly of Tyne Valley, a great grandson of Angus Nicholson, who left the Isle of Skye, Scotland, in 1845 to settle in Prince Edward Island. It was published a few years ago in Massachusetts.

Following the persecution of the oldest of the Scottish clans, and is mentioned in ancient history under the Gaelic name of Kial. The tribe of Kial held the district of Ness which was virtually the whole of northwestern Scotland from the Morven Hills to Loch Brochan. The clan made alliances with the Norse after the Norsemen took the Orkney Islands. "This alliance," writes Mr. Nicholson, "is probably the reason for the name of the clan being so common in our family. The particular aptitude of our people for sudden forays into enemy country gave us the name of the clan as 'the clan of the Kial'."

From one particular ancestor, famous for his fighting ability, the whole clan, including the present name, this warrior was Kiyuel, and the clan called themselves the sons of Kiyuel or MacKiyuel, (also spelled MacKraucuil), which is the Gaelic for the name Nicholson. The chief of the MacKiyuels supported a Scots king, David the Second, in the twelfth century, and received a charter from the king making him a Baron. "The Clan MacKiyuel" writes Mr. Nicholson, "had one fatal failing: they liked to fight too well, and by the fourteenth century all the chiefs of the clan had been killed. They were left only Margaret MacNicol or MacKiyuel, a daughter of the last chief. She married Torquil MacLeod. He was the younger son of the chief of the MacLeod Clan of Lewis.

Death Rate Laid to Poor Nutrition

Toronto, June 5—(CP)—Poor nutrition was responsible for the peak of Canada's infant and maternal mortality rate in 1938, Dr. Ernest Couture, director of the Pensions and National Health Department's maternal and infant hygiene division, told the Canadian Public Health and Ontario Health Officers' Associations meeting here. Only 25 per cent. of Canadian mothers have prenatal care, he said, and to this he attributed the fact that infant and maternal mortality rates are higher in Canada than in the United States, Britain or Norway.

Booklet Gives Short History of Nicholson Clan

"A Short History of the Nicholson Clan" is the title of an interesting booklet, a copy of which was received recently by Mr. C. W. Nicholson, who left the book to his cousin, Mr. Ernest N. Simmons, in Los Angeles, both of them being members of the Nicholson clan on the maternal side. The author of the booklet is Donald A. Nicholson, of Lynn, Mass., formerly of Tyne Valley, a great grandson of Angus Nicholson, who left the Isle of Skye, Scotland, in 1845 to settle in Prince Edward Island. It was published a few years ago in Massachusetts.

Following the persecution of the oldest of the Scottish clans, and is mentioned in ancient history under the Gaelic name of Kial. The tribe of Kial held the district of Ness which was virtually the whole of northwestern Scotland from the Morven Hills to Loch Brochan. The clan made alliances with the Norse after the Norsemen took the Orkney Islands. "This alliance," writes Mr. Nicholson, "is probably the reason for the name of the clan being so common in our family. The particular aptitude of our people for sudden forays into enemy country gave us the name of the clan as 'the clan of the Kial'."

From one particular ancestor, famous for his fighting ability, the whole clan, including the present name, this warrior was Kiyuel, and the clan called themselves the sons of Kiyuel or MacKiyuel, (also spelled MacKraucuil), which is the Gaelic for the name Nicholson. The chief of the MacKiyuels supported a Scots king, David the Second, in the twelfth century, and received a charter from the king making him a Baron. "The Clan MacKiyuel" writes Mr. Nicholson, "had one fatal failing: they liked to fight too well, and by the fourteenth century all the chiefs of the clan had been killed. They were left only Margaret MacNicol or MacKiyuel, a daughter of the last chief. She married Torquil MacLeod. He was the younger son of the chief of the MacLeod Clan of Lewis.
