### SEEDING WELL ON IN WEST

WINNIPEG, April 17—The first reports from Canadian Pacific agents regarding seeding operations were received yesterday. The report of the agents indicate that seeding operations, while not in full blast, may be said to be general throughout the western provinces, and in some portions the work is fairly well advanced on the main line west, Burnside being the first district to report operations as general.

The conditions throughout the country are somewhat uniform, taken as a whole, and no large portion can be said to be much in advance of any other. Seeding is as fully advanced in the new provinces as in Manitoba, and if there is any slight advantage it apparently rests with Saskatchewan. On the whole, the seeding is opening in a way quite satisfactory to those deeply concerned in the grain crop.
