WILFRED COYLE

The death of Wilfred Coyle which occurred in this City on April 14th, in his fifty-fifth year, came as a shock to his many friends.

As a boy he received his education in Queen Square School. After leaving school he entered the employ of the late R. H. Jenkins as a grocery clerk, when by his courteous and kindly manner he made a host of friends.

On the retirement of Mr. Jenkins Wilfred went into the grocery trade on his own, which he successfully conducted until he was appointed Deputy Sheriff for Queen's County. He served in this capacity for about four years when he was appointed to the staff at Falconwood. This post he held for about ten years when he was transferred to the Provincial Infirmary where he remained until the time of his death. In both institutions he made many friends and was well liked by both nurses and patients and was held in high regard by all the officials. Although in failing health for the past two years it was only three weeks before his death that he was forced to retire. He was keenly interested in sports and competed in many events especially the fireman's tournaments. He was a devout member of St. Dunstan's Basilica also the Knights of Columbus and Holy Name societies, both of which turned out in large numbers and preceded the funeral cortege to the church.

Requiem High Mass was sung by the Rev. David McTague who also performed the services at the grave.

Local Art Director Invited To Speak At Boston Conference

It was learned recently that Miss Frances E. Johnston, director of the Charlottetown Art Centre has been invited to attend and speak at the Conference of the American Association of Museums which meets at Boston on May 27 to 29.

The American Association of Museums represents museums of art, science, history and industry in the United States and Canada, and is in touch with related organizations throughout the world.

Miss Johnston, who came here from London, Ontario, about three months ago to take over the job of organizing and conducting a children's art centre here, has been doing a marvelous job along these lines, and in this short space of time has carried out a series of classes for school children in arts and crafts, as well as a number of educational and interesting programs for adult groups on various subjects pertaining to the arts. At a recent meeting of the Art Centre Committee, Miss Johnston reported that approximately 2,500 people have visited the centre since its opening three months ago.

Miss Johnston, who will speak at the convention on the activities and progress being made by the local centre, has also been asked to enter into the discussions which will be carried out there concerning the activities and problems of the Association. In view of the fact that she has visited art galleries and museums of some 50 cities in Canada and the United States, and has a wide knowledge of "The Arts", she will make a valuable contribution to the convention.
