Safe At Home After Harrowing Experience

Aged Truro Woman Rescued After Having Been Missing Since Thursday.

TRURO, N. S., July 28.—Safe at home after 24 hours of wandering through the Colchester County woods, a 91 year old woman tonight told of her harrowing experience. She was Mrs. Roderick MacKenzie of West Branch, who was rescued today after having been lost since Thursday morning.

The aged woman had spent the night on a bed of boughs beneath a spruce tree while a heavy rain-pour drenched the woods. Although bears have been seen frequently in this district, she said she was not afraid and fell asleep as soon as she had lain down.

She told of seeing several moose, but said they did not frighten her "much." She said she had been "very lonely," but had found her plight improved by her determination to "make the best of it."

Late yesterday afternoon, she saw her son John and his daughter Eleanor pass within 100 feet while they searched for her. But they could not hear her feeble shout and continued on out of sight. She was found today by two neighbors, within a mile of her home.

Rail Order For Sydney

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., July 28.—(C.P. Cable)—Sir Newton Moore, President of the Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation, today received a cable from England informing him that the tender of the corporation for 12,000 tons of steel rails for delivery to the South African Government at Cape Town had been accepted.

Sir Newton, who came to Newfoundland recently to inspect the Wabana ore mines of the corporation, said the order would be rolled at Sydney, N. S.

Preliminary Hearing Adjourned

Henwood is under sentence to hang on September 12 for the murder of Mrs. Mabel Smith, 34, at Amherst.

DOMINION ALLOCATION FOR QUEENS

\$40,000 To Be Expended on Public Works in Various Parts of Country.

Mr. W. Chester S. McLure, M.P., has received intimation from the Minister of Public Works that his application for an appropriation for public works in Queens County has been granted to the extent of \$14,000. This money will be expended on work at Red Point, Southport, Tracadie, Vernon Bridge, Fownal, Nine Mile Creek, Bonshaw and Victoria.

FINAL LECTURE OF LIBRARY INSTITUTE

Vote of Thanks Extended Lecturers, And Appreciation of Series Expressed.

The final lecture of the series on the Background of Books, delivered in connection with the Library Institute was given last evening by Dr. G. R. Lomer, Chief Librarian of McGill University. The subject of the lecture was "How Books Are Bound."

The lecturer first described in some detail the manufacture of paper in the earlier ages and at the present time. The manner in which the paper was folded, and the printing process were outlined briefly. Illustrating the process with explanatory slides the lecturer then showed how books are bound together a pasteboard cover was fastened to the book. The binding was then finished with paper, cloth, or leather. Various kinds of leather used in binding were shown on the screen.

At the conclusion of the lecture, Mr. R. H. Rogers moved a vote of thanks to Dr. Lomer and Colonel Bovey for the lectures from which the audiences had derived so much profit. The hearers had often been amused and always interested and had received a great deal of information and inspiration. The lectures on the Background of Books would enable one to make in the future wiser and better selections of books. The mind could not take in new knowledge without a framework of knowledge on which the new might be built. The audiences owed a great debt of gratitude to those who made the lectures possible.

The motion was seconded by Mr. C. H. Black, who also expressed great appreciation of the lectures.

Dr. Lomer in replying expressed the hope that as many as possible would attend the convocation today.

Issues Storm Warning

WASHINGTON, July 28.—(A.P.)—The weather bureau today issued the following storm warning: "Advisory report from Bahamas 12 noon indicate centre tropical disturbance is between Watling Island and Cat Island moving northwestward. No strong winds reported, but caution still advised vessels in path."

HAVANA, July 28.—(A.P.)—The National Observatory at 12 o'clock E.S.T., today said the hurricane in the West Indies was in the vicinity of San Salvador Island, the Bahamas, and was moving northwest.

Fire In Woods Near St. Peters

A fire in the woods about three miles north of St. Peters was reported to the Mounted Police headquarters by the R. C. M. P. seaplans yesterday. About 100 men were fighting the flames. Inspector Fripps instructed two officers from the Souris Detachment to proceed at once to St. Peters.

The fire began several days ago, and is now reported to be near several farm dwellings.

\$100,000 Damage By Fire In Quebec Store

QUEBEC, July 28.—Following unexplained explosion in the second storey of the American stores building on St. Joseph Street late today, fire spread rapidly to the adjoining Imperial Theatre destroying both buildings and damaging many nearby structures. A general alarm was rung in and it was announced early tonight the blaze had been brought under control. An unofficial estimate placed damages at more than \$100,000.

Narcotics Valued At \$50,000 Are Seized

HONOLULU, July 28.—(A.P.)—Narcotics valued at \$50,000 were seized on the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Canada when she docked here last night and the owners of the contraband were fined \$50,500 today by J. Walter Doyle, Collector of Customs.

The fine was \$20 for each of 1,620 ounces discovered in the crew's laundry.

Lo Fat Sau, Chinese steward, was held on a charge of attempting to smuggle the narcotics. Officers said Lo confessed ownership.

Lindbergh May Fly To Norway

OSLO, Norway, July 28.—(A.P.)—It was reported here today that Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, on an aerial mapping tour of the North Atlantic flying route, would fly from Greenland to Stavanger, Norway, as soon as favorable weather appeared.

At Stavanger, a seaport in southwest Norway, a supply of oil and gasoline was ordered delivered for Colonel Lindbergh's use.

Balbo Extends Thanks To Nfld. Premier

Held Criminally Responsible For Family's Death

Michael Bradley Is Charged With Murder Of His Father, Mother, Sister, Brother And Uncle — Refuses Evidence.

(Canadian Press) — CHAPEAU, Que., July 28.—The arrest of Michael Bradley tonight on a charge of murder culminated the investigation into the startling tragedy of one week ago when five people, the family of Joseph Bradley, were shot to death at Demers Centre a mile and a half from this hamlet.

While thunder and wind rocked the little community hall this afternoon and rain pounded on the roof so heavily that the voices of the witnesses could not be heard above the din, a coroner's inquest found Michael Bradley criminally responsible for the deaths of his father, mother, sister, brother and uncle.

The accused man, who lives a mile and a half from the scene of the shooting, his father's farm, was called as a witness but on the advice of his counsel, refused to give evidence. He will be arraigned at Campbells Bay, Que., next Wednesday, and it is understood a prominent Montreal legal firm will take the defence.

Bradley has been in the custody of provincial police for several days as a material witness.

REGINA, July 28.—Judging of the grasses and field roots tonight closed the competitive classes at the World's Grain Exhibition and Conference.

Alberta carried off three firsts in the grasses, Ontario took two and Prince Edward Island and Manitoba took one each. British Columbia took all three awards in the field roots.

Prince Edward Island's first award was won by George A. MacMillan of Cornwall in the bent grasses, Agrostis other than red top, and Manitoba's victory was earned by P. J. Bosc, Notre Dame de Lourdes, who was first in Meadow Fescue.

Another Cornwall grower, Gordon MacMillan, was second in the bent grasses, New Brunswick grass seed growers, St. Joseph, N. B., was third and Frank Mullaly, Souris, P. E. I., was fourth.
