(From Yesterday's Evening Guardian) (Special by Phone.) SUMMERSIDE, February 14-The case of Jacob Murray was the next to come before the Magistrate's Court yesterday afternoon.

The next prisoner to come up for trial was Edger Cannon. He was charged with stealing a pair of black foxes from the ranch of Carruthers and Barbour on the 6th of February.

The first witness was Charles Burke of Elmisdale. He knew the defendant. He had heard that Mr. Birch had lost a pair of foxes about that time.

PARIS, Feb. 10 (Special)-The "Journal" publishes an astounding story of how the Bonnot gang, instead of being put on trial early next month, narrowly missed the opportunity of committing a new crime and escaping from the Sante prison.

Among those in custody at the remand prison was a man named Eckerlin, who had just been sentenced to five years for theft, and was awaiting his transfer to a convict prison. His cell happened to be near the quarters of Warder Bras. The latter recently had leave for an evening, and on returning found his room had been ransacked and everything, even to his uniform and revolver, stolen. Chief Warden Mallard was notified and a search was made for Bras's clothes, because the first idea was that a practical joke.

By and by they met a strange warder on the second-floor landing. "Hello, who are you? What's your name?" cried M. Mallard. The man whisked out a revolver, tried to kill himself. The warders were too quick for him and knocked his arm up as he was firing.

It was then found that it was Eckerlin who had stolen Bras's uniform, arms, keys, and money, and he made no secret of his intention to walk out of the prison an hour later. But a more curious discovery was made, the daring prisoner had in his possession a written paper telling him where to find the cells of the leading members of the Bonnot gang, and giving him the numbers of the first four he was to unlock, namely, these of Carony, Callemin, Ganzy, and Rodriguez. Eckerlin declares that he doesn't know how such a document got into his cell, when he was arrested.

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EUROPEAN NEWS

BERLIN, Feb. 6 (Special)-The year 1913 marks a notable passage in the history of Prussia. A hundred years ago Prussia rose against Napoleon, who was already weakened by the retreat from Moscow, and with the help of the Austrians, and also of a very large body of Russians, they managed to drive the French army over the frontier, after defeating it in the tremendous two days' struggle at Leipzig.

Many are the centennial celebrations that are arranged for this year, and, as a conclusion, it is hoped that the Czar will visit the battlefield of Leipzig at the end of the year in company with the Kaiser. The Russian co-operation at Leipzig, it should be explained, was particularly strong, and at least 22,000 Russian troops were killed in the fight.

Histories of the war, generally known as the "War of Liberation," are also being issued in different degrees of so-called "patriotic" lyrics, and, naturally enough, one or two of these deal with the part that women played in the war. In one of these Major Noel, one of the chief students of the history of this campaign, gives a sketch of the career of seventeen daughters of Prussia, who were specially prominent in the
