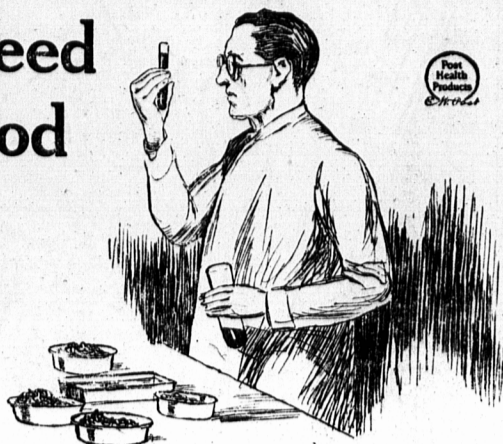

QUEBEC, April 30.—Confirmation could not be obtained this evening of the report that the Wayagamack Pulp & Paper Company had purchased the Island of Anticosti in the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Inquiries at the Department of Lands and Forests failed to elicit any substantiation or denial. Government officials merely contented themselves with saying that they had heard of the report.

President C. R. Whitehead, of the Wayagamack Company, is at present on route to this country from Europe.

The report has it that the price offered to Senator Gaston Menier, son of a Senator, proprietor of the island, is in the neighborhood of \$6,000,000, only in return that whilst offering up the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass you kindly remember your old friends of St. Alexis Parish.

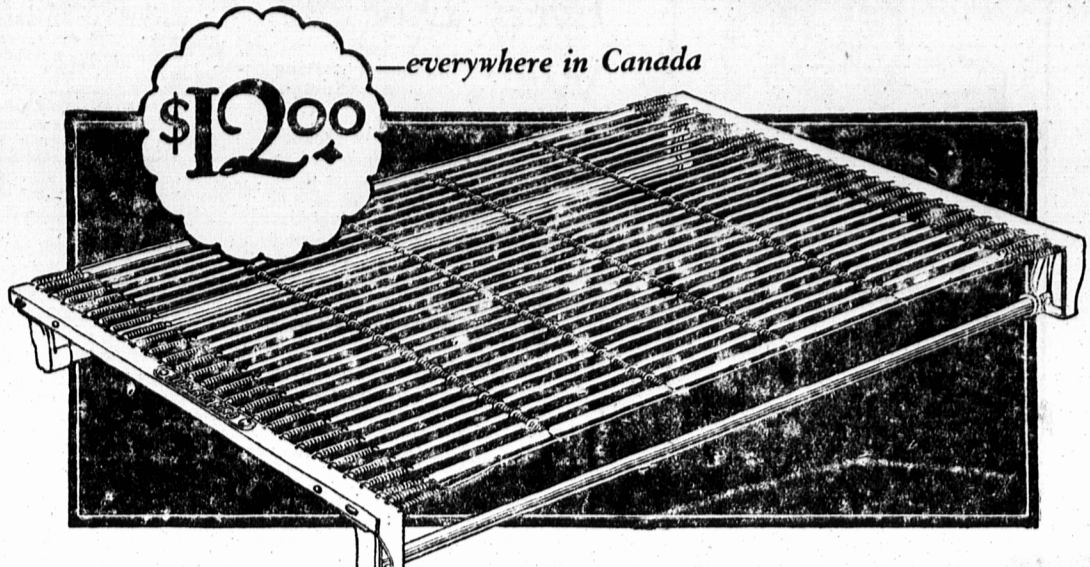
