NEW HAVEN, Conn., Sept. 15.—August B. Miller, engineer of the White Mountain Express, which wrecked the Bar Harbor Express on September 2, at North Haven, was arrested to-day on a bench warrant obtained by the State's Attorney, charged with manslaughter. In the wreck twenty-one persons lost their lives and two were injured. Eleven still remain in hospitals here. Miller pleaded "Not Guilty" and his bond was fixed at \$5,000. It was furnished.

CHANGE OF TEXT BOOKS.—Several important changes have been made by the Education Department in the text books for use in the primary schools of the island during the ensuing school year. A history of England, which is on the lines of that used in the Ontario public schools, but has been altered in certain respects to suit local conditions, and which is retailed at 25 cts., has been substituted for Melkijohn's History, which used to be retailed at 30 cts. a copy. In regard to the study of physiology and hygiene, a book entitled "How to be healthy," retailed at 45 cts., takes the place of Health Readers, Nos. 1 and 2, the retail price of which was 50 cts. Britain's Elementary Agriculture and Nature Study, at 45 cents, has been substituted for James's Agriculture, 30 cts., and Spotton's Botany, 60 cts. A similar change has been made in regard to the study of French, one book replacing two. Fraser and Squair's French Grammar, retailed at 60 cts., takes the place of Cram's Elementary French at 50 cts., and Fraser and Squair's Advanced Grammar, at \$1.00. Other changes are contemplated which will materially lessen the cost of the text books to the pupil while securing what is considered more suitable and more useful works.
