**CARE OF HAIR BRUSH**

It is impossible to overestimate the danger to the hair of unclean brushes. Brushes should be carefully cleaned and disinfected once a week and there is a way to do it so as not to injure them. The brush and comb must first be quickly washed, then dipped in a water with boric acid and then sunned and aired. An expensively-backed brush may be cleaned by dipping the bristles alone in a strong solution of ammonia and water. After this, run hot and cold water alternately over this part of the brush, shake it vigorously, and put bristles down, over a rest of some sort to dry in the open air.

If the bristles of the brush have lost their stiffness or elasticity, treat them to an ammonia and salt bath. First wash the bristles in hot water to which ammonia has been added, and then dip directly into water to which salt has been added. Dry the brush, with bristles up, in the open air.

Borax also cleans a brush well. Dissolve the borax in hot water and dip in the bristles. Rinse thoroughly when clean, and dry, with bristles up, in open air. Combs can be cleaned with borax or ammonia, but ammonia sometimes discolors colored celluloid combs.

Another admirable method of cleaning brushes is to use dry bran. Naturally, this method is easier on the brushes. Rub the bran in thoroughly, as you would rub orris root into the hair, then shake and rub it out. It will take out all grease; bran can be safely used with brushes having bristles set in rubber, which cannot be cleaned with water.

**Plain Pastry.**

1-2 cups of flour, cold water, 1-2 teaspoonful salt, 1-2 teaspoonful baking powder, 1-2 cup shortening.

Sift together the flour, salt and baking powder, and work in the shortening with the tips of the fingers. When the mixture resembles coarse meal, add just enough cold water to make the particles adhere. Turn out on a floured board, and roll thin. For one-crust pie, grease the outside of a pie plate, place the pastry on it and pinch about the edge to make a deeper border prick in several places, and bake in a hot oven. A crust like this, on one made of a rich biscuit dough, is preferable in custard or pumpkin pies.

**HORSES REQUIRE SPECIAL CARE**

How to get the most work out of his horses without overdoing them or badly breaking them down in their condition of thrift and usefulness, is a problem that the farmer faces every spring, as summer approaches. Upon how well he solves this problem depends a great deal of the success of spring and summer farming operations. In warm weather thorough grooming is almost as important as feeding. Without it, dried sweat, lead skin and dirt clog the pores, make the horse uncomfortable and affect his health.

Look out for sore shoulders and backs, especially in plowing. Be sure that the collars fit. A collar too big is as bad as one too small. If the collar rides up, use a margarine or a fifth running from trace to trace, back of the forelegs.

When the horses are at work on a warm day, lift up the collars now and then to cool their shoulders, and wipe off the sweat and dirt with a bunch of grass.

Wipe off the harness marks on your horses when you stop work at noon and at night, and clean the inside of the harness, the collars especially. The salt sweat, drying on the skin and on the harness, is what makes him trouble.

If the skin is wrinkled under the collar or saddle, bathe it with diluted vinegar or witchhazel. If the skin is broken, bathe it with clean, warm water containing a little salt. For the collar, with padding or otherwise, so that it will not chafe the horse, spot the next day. A little carelessness at the beginning may cause a lot of trouble to you and suffering to the horse.

Clean your horse's at night, water him, give them a good bed and water him again after they have eaten their hay so that they will not be thirsty all night. Let them rest an hour or more before they are grainfed.

The observance of these simple rules will not cost you a cent, will make a big difference in their condition, and will add much to their comfort and endurance.

**CURIOSITIES OF THE CALENDAR**
