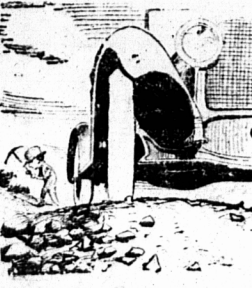

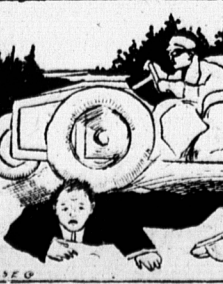

Mr. J. D. STEWART'S REPLY

It is an old adage that declares "we should not look a gift horse in the mouth" to look for defects. We are grateful for this measure of protection and the free trade and near free trade Liberal party is to be commended for it although it was deemed the part of political sagacity to throw a cloak over it.

Elsewhere in this issue we publish the reply of Mr. J. D. Stewart, Leader of the Conservative Party to Premier Bell's Budget speech. The speech, as speeches go these days, was comparatively short, although in reply to one that even in these days was comparatively long. It was short but effective, short and sharp and convincing, and even Liberals who heard it declare it was one of the most effective speeches ever delivered in the provincial legislature.

PROTECTION

The federal department of Agriculture has given notice of a protective order prohibiting the importation into Canada of potatoes from Europe, Newfoundland, St. Pierre and Miquelon and the States of California, Pennsylvania and West Virginia.

Europe, Newfoundland, St. Pierre and Miquelon are as likely to send us potatoes as Greenland and Iceland, but these are a part of the cloak. The protection required and which is provided by the bill is against California, Pennsylvania and West Virginia from which states we import early spring potatoes. The importation of these potatoes affects the sale of our winter stored potatoes and in the interests of our merchants and farmers the importation is prohibited.

There are few subjects in which the world is as deeply interested today as that of liquor control and there are few upon which it is so difficult to obtain intelligent and unbiased judgment. There are the extremists who condemn without a hearing, there are the drinkers, moderate and immoderate, who want it for themselves and who care little what injury it may do to others; there are the brewers, the wholesalers, the retailers whose only interest in the business is to make money out of it.

Dr. Houston in his excellent lecture on the subject before the Caledonian Club on Thursday night, and which we purpose publishing in full in the Guardian, has treated it most fairly and impartially, giving not only his own opinion but the informed opinions of scientists, medical doctors, philanthropists and even of victims of alcoholism.

Dr. Houston admits that alcohol has some medical value; that it has some food value, that in certain diseases it is more convenient than other substitutes which might effect the same purpose. He even admits that alcohol in various forms may be taken without injury in moderation, but he expresses the opinion and fortifies it with the opinions of others that there would be no more sickness and no more deaths if alcoholic liquors were entirely abolished.

From the viewpoint of health the world would get along very much as it is getting along today without alcoholic liquor in any form.

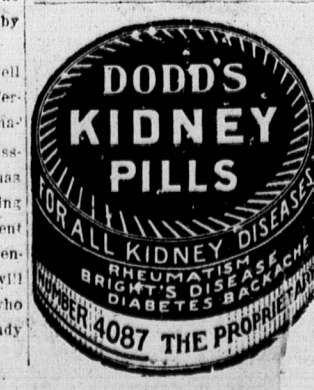
