BISHOP TAYLOR

(Continued From Page 1)

I fall, go to the best concert there is in town. Don't grieve for me, or think of me as dead; just think of me as a billenting officer who has gone on to get a place ready for you."

But now I must leave the war and turn to the present—to our own lives, as we are living them today. God has made us for a purpose—every soul before me tonight was fashioned by the love of God. No two souls are alike.

And what is that purpose? You'll find it in Rev. 4-11. "Thou art worthy, O Lord, to receive glory and honour and power, for Thou hast created all things, and for Thy pleasure they are and were created."

There you have the answer. You were created for God's pleasure. Each should ask himself this question: Am I giving pleasure to God, or is my life such that I am displeasing Him? God forbid!

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West Coast of Africa. I took passage home on a large ocean steamer.

At first we made our way down a great river. Just when we were nearing the mouth, I was talking to an officer. All at once he broke off the conversation and said, "Excuse me, Sir, I must go up on the bridge, to set the course." The ship was dropping the pilot, and was about to set out upon the trackless ocean.

So with the young people, carefully guided and guarded through school and college, he came to the river's mouth, drop the pilot, and shape their course, for good or ill, upon the broad ocean of life.

As the officer left me to go up on the bridge, I pondered on what he would do there—what steps would be taken to place the ship upon her homeward path.

The officer would go first to the compass—which, in figure, represents a man's conscience.

Oh! my young people, as you set your course in life, let nothing interfere with your conscience. If you are shipwrecked will follow.

Then the officer would go to the chart which shows where the deep waters are, and where the dangerous rocks and shoals lie.

Oh! my young friends! See that you neglect not the Bible—your chart—which will help you to avoid the shoals and dangerous rocks which lie all about your way.

Then the sailor would observe the stars, and make his calculations to keep his ship on her course. I think of prayer as the calculation of these things, and of their path over the sea of life.

I think of the wheel and the rudder—the will and the tongue. How much harm can come from a careless use of the wheel—the will; and the tongue—the rudder.

The sailors of the old time had to depend on the fickle wind to drive their ship on, but nowadays our ships are driven by steam engine and screw. So, in the life of the soul, the indwelling spirit, drives us forward, if we but trust in—through storm and calm—through fair weather or foul—to the haven where we would be.

Then there is the Captain, whose will is supreme. A captain once said to an apprentice just joining his ship "my boy, on this ship there are just two things, many—or duty."

Need I press the point of this parable further on the attention of the young people? Obey your Captain! That is your duty—and everything else is mutiny.

And, once more, do not forget to make the right of your compass your chart, your wheel and your rudder if you would find yourself safe in port at the end of your voyage.

A feature of the meeting of the Provincial Ministerial Association yesterday forenoon in Zion Church Sunday School was the address given by Bishop Taylor Smith who arrived in the city Thursday evening.

Rev. M. Scott Fulton presided at the meeting and the Bishop was introduced by Rev. H. D. Raymond.

His Lordship first called for a few brief words of prayer, and then stated he intended to give what might be called an address. It would be merely a thinking aloud in their presence.

He then gave a very impressive earnest and inspiring talk, speaking quietly, but with very clear enunciation, and with the force of the last words of the Master to His disciples when they went up on the Mount of Olives. The disciples, like people of today, wanted to talk politics, but Christ spoke of the power of the Holy Spirit, working in and through them.

For what purpose shall we receive this power? said His Lordship. To see and hear Jesus Christ in the flesh, now He had gone in the flesh to another world. It was then pointed out that God had fulfilled His promise, as He fulfills every promise, to send the Holy Spirit, with this Spirit the world with its allurements, the flesh with its subtleties, the devil with his experience can be faced.

This is a wonderful promise, a wonderful gift, but we are slow to appreciate it.

Ministers pray that we may receive more of the Holy Spirit, when it is there for the accepting. It assures victory over self and sin. After using as an illustration a credit balance at the bank, the speaker said:

"We are learning the big lesson, that we work from an almighty power with an almighty power, from a credit balance that can never be exhausted."

The various attributes of Jehovah as suggested by the 23rd Psalm were next referred to. This psalm is the psalm of the "Name" not the psalm of the Crook (the shepherd's psalm) or the psalm of the Crown.

Can you and I justify this name? It has been a wonderful name to me, since coming to Canada, continued His Lordship. Goodness and mercy have followed me everywhere, all my plans have worked out perfectly. Jesus Christ has justified His Name. He saves us from ourselves and our sins. Do we justify His name as His under-shepherds, his under-fishermen? Do we justify the position of men called to the great task of soul workers? Do we understand God's work? This work is to work us all the time. God's work is the work which He does to us and through us.

When Joshua was leading the children of Israel to the Promised Land, and came to the walls of Jericho, he saw a man with a drawn sword, and asked him, Are you with us or against us? Neither, was the reply. You are for me. Christ is always in the forefront leading us from victory unto victory.

The Bishop in the course of his talk related a number of incidents in his own experience. He had preached a sermon on a troop ship on its way to India. When he had concluded he overheard a little girl, the daughter of one of the officers, say, "Mamma, is that Jesus?"

Would that we could have the thoughts and the words, and look like Him, said His Lordship in closing.

After the meeting the members proceeded to St. Paul's Parish Hall, where they were the guests of that church at luncheon.
